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GLOSSARY OF TYPES OF HAIR AND PRICKLES

Aculeate prickly, with sharp prickles

Barbed with short, rigid, reflexed bristles

(Comment: Would prefer hooked to reflexed)

Bristly with stiff, strong trichomes. See also setose and hispid

Ciliate with fine, conspicuous, marginal trichomes

Downy short, weak, soft trichomes. See also pubescent

(Comment: All definitions seem to suggest downy is synonymous with

pubescent – do not think we need downy)

Glabrate, Glabrous without trichomes, smooth, hairless

(Comment: Glabrate = almost hairless, glabrous = without hairs. We

should have them listed separately)

Hirsute with long, straight, coarse, trichomes

Hispid with very long, stiff trichomes, bristly

(Comment: Cannot find any reference to the hairs having to be very long. With stiff bristly trichomes, harsh to the touch. Not so distinct

or sharp as setose)

Pilose with soft, shaggy, diffuse, slender trichomes

Pubescent with short, fine, soft, straight, slender trichomes

Setose with sharp, pointed, bristly trichomes

Strigose with stiff, sharp, coarse, adpressed, bristly trichomes

Tomentose with dense, woolly, short, rigid, interwoven trichomes

(Comment: Do not think the hairs are rigid)

Trichome unbranched hairlike out growth of the epidermis

Velutinose with very dense, fine, soft, straight, long, velvet like trichomes

(Comment: The trichomes are not velvet like – it is the appearance of

the surface that is velvet like)

Terms are derived from A. E. Radford, Vascular Plant Systematics and RHS Encyclopedia of Gardening.

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Other terms to consider

Lanate woolly, with long densely matted or curling trichomes

Villous with long shaggy trichomes

Prickle a sharp pointed outgrowth from the superficial tissues.

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
