New PCT Rules Strengthen International Patent Searches

New amendments to the PCT Regulations entered into force on 1 January 2026. Amendments to PCT Rules 34, 36 and 63 set out a revised definition of the minimum documentation that an International Searching Authority is required to consult during international search, along with changes to the minimum requirements that an International Searching and Preliminary Examining Authority needs to satisfy before it can be appointed and that it needs to continue to satisfy during its appointment. Nineteen additional national patent collections have been included.

Amendments to PCT Rules 33 and 64 had the effect of broadening the definition of relevant prior art for international search and preliminary examination to include non-written disclosures. At the same time, PCT International Searching Authorities and the patent Offices of Contracting States have begun exchanging the full text of patent applications, replacing image-only formats that were still used in some cases.

These changes will enable more comprehensive searches for applicants, with broader geographic coverage and types of prior art being identified. Most of the newly included patent collections are already available through the PATENTSCOPE database. Details on rule changes can be found at PCT Newsletter [12/2025](#). PCT Patent Prosecution Highway (PCT-PPH) Pilots: IP5 PPH Pilot Program Extended to 2029

According to a joint decision made by the China National Intellectual Property Administration (CNIPA), the European Patent Office (EPO), the Japan Patent Office (JPO), the Ministry of Intellectual Property (MOIP) of the Republic of Korea, and the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), the IP5 Patent Prosecution Highway (PPH) pilot program will be extended for another three years, from 6 January 2026 to 5 January 2029. The program accepts PCT international work products, including written opinions of the ISA (WO-ISA) and international preliminary examination reports (IPER) as a basis for applicants to request accelerated processing of their patent applications.

New Version of WIPO Standard ST.3 Published in December 2025

A revised WIPO Standard ST.3 (RECOMMENDED STANDARD ON TWO-LETTER CODES FOR THE REPRESENTATION OF STATES, OTHER ENTITIES INTERGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS) was published on the WIPO website on 18 December 2025, taking effect from that date.

The main revisions include:

- The addition of a two-letter code 'FM' for Micronesia (Federated States of).
- Editorial corrections in the French and Spanish versions to improve accuracy and ensure consistency across all language versions.

BA Bosnia and Herzegovina (fees)

The **Institute for Intellectual Property of Bosnia and Herzegovina** has notified corrections to the transmittal fee and the fee for requesting the preparation and transmission to the International Bureau (IB) of a priority document, payable to the Office in its capacity as receiving Office.

BG Bulgaria (no longer accepts payment in Bulgarian lev from 1 February 2026)

As from 1 February 2026, payment of fees to the **Patent Office of the Republic of Bulgaria** can only be made in **euro (EUR)**. It will no longer be possible to pay fees in Bulgarian lev (BGN).

DK Denmark (fees)

EA Eurasian Patent Organization (fees)

SV El Salvador (number of copies on paper; who can act as agent)

The **National Center of Registries (CNR) (El Salvador)** has changed the number of copies of an international application required by it if the application is filed on paper – one copy must now be filed, instead of three.

The Office has also informed about the requirements as to who can act as agent before the Office in its capacity as receiving Office or designated (or elected) Office, which are now as follows: any person residing in El Salvador; if the agent is a lawyer, they must be a lawyer authorized to practice in El Salvador.

Practical Advice

Essential information to be included in an international application if a last-minute filing cannot be avoided

Q.: Our client has instructed our patent firm only this morning, the last day of the priority period, to file a PCT application. We have the description, claims and drawings, which will be the same as the priority application. We still need to contact the client to double-check whether we have all the information desired to be included in the application but we are concerned about missing the priority period. What information must we submit with the international application before the priority period expires?

A.: Before the priority period expires, you need to submit everything that is necessary to obtain an international filing date and any information that you cannot add or correct subsequently without affecting the international filing date.

The requirements for obtaining an international filing date are listed in [PCT Article 11\(1\)](#). As far as the bibliographic data is concerned, in addition to the applicant's name, it is essential to indicate a country of nationality or residence which is a PCT Contracting State. You need this information to show that the applicant does not obviously lack, for reasons of residence or nationality, the right to file an international application with the receiving Office (RO). Residence or nationality depends on national law of the relevant Contracting State and is determined by the RO. PCT [Article 11](#)(1)(i) and (ii) further require that the application be filed with a competent RO and be in a prescribed language. However, if these conditions are not fulfilled, PCT [Rule 19.4](#) requires the RO to transmit the application to the International Bureau as a receiving Office (RO/IB), which is a competent RO for all Contracting States and accepts any language for the purpose of according an international filing date.

You must include the name, address and nationality of the applicant in the request form filed in the application. However, provided you can demonstrate that the applicant has the right to file the international application with the receiving Office for reasons of residency or nationality, if there are inaccuracies in the address, you may be able to request a change to be recorded under PCT [Rule 92bis](#) after filing without affecting the international filing date that has been accorded.

To obtain an international filing date, the application must also include an indication that it is intended as a PCT application and the designation of at least one PCT Contracting State. These indications are generated by the electronic filing systems accepted by the various ROs for PCT applications, noting that PCT [Rule 4.9](#) states that the filing of a PCT Request constitutes the designation of all Contracting States that are bound by the PCT on the international filing date.

The Request must be signed, and where it is signed by the agent, in general a power of attorney signed by the applicant must be furnished (PCT [Rules 4.1\(d\)](#), [4.15](#), [26.2bis\(a\)](#), [51bis.1](#)(a)(vi) and [90](#)). However, most ROs have waived the requirement that a power be furnished and therefore will not invite you to furnish one if it is missing (for details about each RO, consult the [PCT Applicant's Guide](#), Annex C and the webpage on [Waivers of powers of attorney requirement](#)). Moreover, you can add a missing signature and correct a defect relating to the signature under Article 14(1)(a)(i) and PCT [Rule 26](#) after filing, without affecting the international filing date. You should therefore not continue trying to obtain the applicant's (or agent's) signature at the risk of missing the priority period. It is important, however, that you have the power of attorney in your own file as soon as possible in case you need to withdraw the application later (in which case the signature of all applicants is always required—PCT [Rule](#)

[90bis.5](#)). Also, in the national phase, designated Offices may ask you to submit any power which had not been submitted in the international phase.

You may also want to ask the client for other details at this stage, even it is possible to add or correct them within specific time limits and maintain the international filing date accorded to the application. For example, priority claims (PCT Rules [4.10](#) and [26bis](#)), declarations (PCT Rules [4.17](#) and [26ter](#)) and any indications relating to a designation as continuation or continuation-in-part (PCT Rules [4.11](#) and [26quater](#)) may be added or corrected without affecting the international filing date. It is also possible to submit an abstract for the international application after the international filing date.

Furthermore, fees may be paid within one month from the international filing date (PCT Rules [14.1\(c\)](#), [15.3](#) and [16.1\(f\)](#)), and may be even paid within an additional month subject to the payment of a late payment fee (refer to PCT [Rule 16bis](#)). As the RO will not transmit the search copy before the search fee has been paid, it is recommended to pay as soon as possible as this could affect when you receive the international search report and written opinion. Any required translation for the international search and/or publication should also be furnished as soon as possible; for details, please refer to PCT [Rule 12.3](#) and [12.4](#).

PCT Fee Tables

(amounts on 1 January 2026, unless otherwise indicated)

The following Tables show the amounts and currencies of the main PCT fees which are payable to the receiving Offices (ROs) and the International Preliminary Examining Authorities (IPEAs) during the international phase under Chapter I (Tables I(a) and I(b)) and under Chapter II (Table II). Fees which are payable only in particular circumstances are not shown; nor are details of certain reductions and refunds which may be available; such information can be found in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annexes C, D and E. Note that all amounts are subject to change due to variations in the fees themselves or fluctuations in exchange rates. The international filing fee may be reduced by CHF 100, 200 or 300 where the international application, or part of the international application, is filed in electronic form, as prescribed under Item 4(a), (b) and (c) of the Schedule of Fees (annexed to the Regulations under the PCT) and the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, paragraph 5.189. A 90% reduction in the international filing fee (including the fee per sheet over 30), the supplementary search handling fee and the handling fee, as well as an exemption from the transmittal fee payable to the International Bureau as receiving Office, is also available to applicants from certain States—refer to footnotes 2 and 14. (Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) The footnotes to the Fee Tables follow Table II.

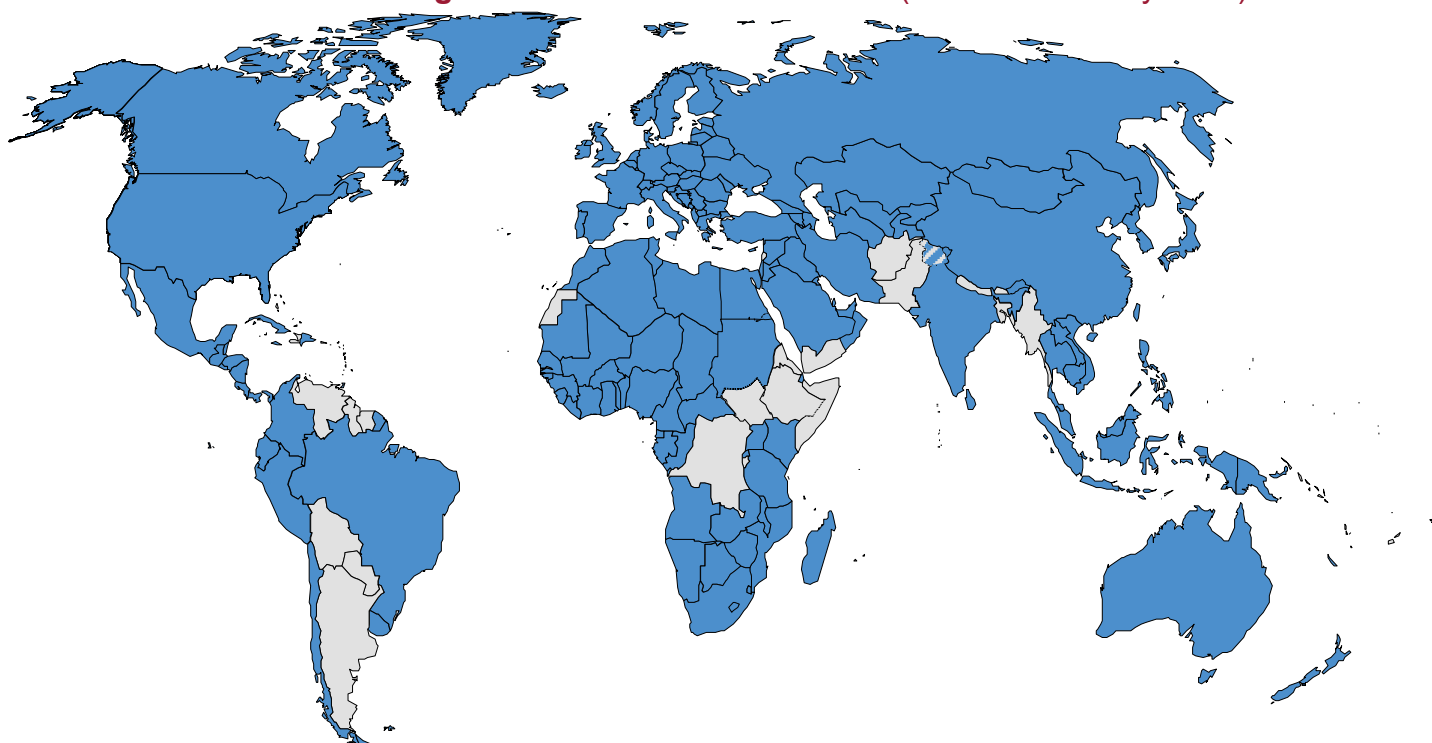

PCT Working Group – Eighteenth Session

The eighteenth session of the PCT Working Group resumed in Geneva on 2 February 2026, following its previous discussions from 18 to 20 February 2025. The following topics were considered by the Working Group during the eighteenth session.

Electronic processing of international applications

The Working Group agreed to submit amendments to Rules 4, 45*bis*, 92*bis* and 94 of the PCT Regulations for approval by the PCT Assembly at its session in July 2026, with the aim of improving electronic services and providing a higher degree of protection for personal data provided for PCT processing. The amendments will require the provision of an email address and a telephone number for processing an international application, allow the exclusion of certain personal data from public access, and provide a basis for changing the address to which correspondence is to be addressed later than 30 months from the priority date (refer to document PCT/WG/18/8 and Annex I to document PCT/WG/18/20).

Establishing equivalent amounts of PCT fees

The Working Group agreed to submit to the Assembly proposed modifications to Directives of the PCT Assembly relating to the Establishment of Equivalent Amounts of Certain Fees to streamline the process for establishing equivalent amounts and reduce the time between a fluctuation in an exchange rate and the entry into force of a new equivalent amount to reflect that fluctuation (refer to document PCT/WG/18/12 and Annex II to document PCT/WG/18/20).

Proposal to transmit a copy of the notification of withdrawal (Form PCT/RO/136) to the applicant

The Working Group approved, in principle, modifications to Section 326 of the Administrative Instructions and paragraph 322 of the PCT Receiving Office Guidelines which would provide a basis for receiving Offices that wish to do so, to inform the applicant of the processing status of a withdrawal request when the receiving Office transmits the notice effecting such withdrawal to the International Bureau (refer to document PCT/WG/18/10 and Annex III to document PCT/WG/18/20).

Filing medium for entering the national phase before designated Offices

The Working Group discussed a study on electronic-only national phase entry and proposals to amend the PCT Regulations that would enable designated or elected Offices to require national phase entry by electronic means, subject to certain conditions. The Working Group invited the International Bureau to consider the amendments further, taking into account the comments made at the session (refer to document PCT/WG/18/4 Rev.).

International publication-related processes

The Working Group discussed proposed changes to the format of international publication that would separate the international search report and any possible statements concerning claims amended under Article 19, which would simplify the publication process and facilitate further text-based processing, and invited the International Bureau to provide additional information or revised plans, taking into account the comments made (refer to document PCT/WG/18/13).

Procedure for extension of appointment of International Searching and Preliminary Examining Authorities

The Working Group agreed on the procedure for the Assembly of the PCT Union (PCT Assembly) to decide on the extension of appointment of International Searching and Preliminary Examining Authorities and the format of the associated new agreements between the International Bureau and each Authority (refer to documents PCT/WG/18/5, PCT/WG/18/6 and PCT/WG/18/15).

- coordination of patent examiner training (see document PCT/WG/18/11);
- a status report of the PCT Minimum Documentation Task Force (see document PCT/WG/18/17);
- a status report of the Sequence Listings Task Force (see document PCT/WG/18/18 Rev.);
- processing sequence listings (see document PCT/WG/18/14);
- a report on the international search report feedback pilot, in which participating Offices provide feedback on international search reports issued by a participating International Searching Authority for international applications entering the national phase (see document PCT/WG/18/7).
- the WIPO Treaty on Intellectual Property, Genetic Resources and Associated Traditional Knowledge (see document PCT/WG/18/16);
- a minor correction of the French version of Rule 26.3^{ter} (see document PCT/WG/18/3);
- consequential amendments related to the filing medium of international applications (see document PCT/WG/18/19);

- a report on the thirty-first session of the Meeting of International Authorities under the PCT (see document PCT/WG/18/2).

PCT Committee for Technical Cooperation

The thirty-third session of the PCT Committee for Technical Cooperation was held in Geneva on 2 and 3 February 2026.

The Committee discussed the application from the Mexican Institute of Industrial Property (IMPI) to be appointed as an International Searching Authority and International Preliminary Examining Authority (ISA/IPEA) under the PCT (see document PCT/CTC/33/27). The Committee also discussed the applications for extension of appointment of all 25 existing ISA/IPEAs, the periods of appointment of which will expire on 31 December 2027 (see documents PCT/CTC/33/2 to 26). The Committee agreed to recommend to the PCT Assembly the appointment of IMPI as an ISA/IPEA and the extension of appointment of all existing ISA/IPEAs.

The Committee also approved a new format for the model agreement to be used as a basis for preparing the individual agreements that each Office or organization will have with the International Bureau in relation to its functioning as an ISA/IPEA from 1 January 2028. The new format for the agreement will no longer have separate annexes setting out the operational information for each ISA/IPEA; this information will be published in the *Official Notices (PCT Gazette)* and reflected in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*. When approving the new format, the Committee agreed to submit to the Assembly amendments to the PCT Regulations necessary for use of the new format for the agreements (see document PCT/CTC/33/28). These amendments will be considered by the PCT Assembly in July 2026 when it decides on the appointment of IMPI and the extensions of appointment of existing ISA/IPEAs and, where appropriate, approves the individual draft agreements between each Office or organization and the International Bureau.

PCT User Survey reveals high satisfaction levels

The PCT continues to offer a strong, consistent and highly valued service, according to WIPO's most recent PCT user satisfaction survey, carried out in late 2025.

Overall, 90% of respondents said they were either "very satisfied" (44%) or "satisfied" (46%) with the PCT-related services provided by WIPO – in line with previous survey results from 2023 and 2021, and a slight increase on the 88% satisfaction rating in 2019.

The survey is conducted every two years as part of WIPO's ongoing efforts to monitor and continuously improve customer satisfaction. The latest survey was made available in all 10 PCT publication languages during the final quarter of 2025 and received more than 1,700 responses.

Respondents were invited to rate a range of services such as processing of PCT applications by the International Bureau (IB) (including in its capacity as receiving Office), ePCT functions and services, PCT information resources and training provided by WIPO. They also had the opportunity to provide text comments and suggest areas for possible improvement.

The IB is analyzing the survey feedback in detail with a view to further improving PCT services, and PCT users are as always also welcome to send comments and suggestions at any time to:

Technology diffusion under the spotlight in World IP Report 2026

New research from WIPO sheds light on the critical factors that help turn new inventions into widely adopted, impactful innovations.

The World Intellectual Property Report 2026: Technology on the Move draws on 250 years of historical data on technology use and five decades of patent data to explore changing patterns of technology diffusion.

The report finds that new innovations are spreading much more rapidly than innovation in previous eras. The time between the invention of new technologies and their first use worldwide is shrinking, and the technology use gap between advanced economies and others is narrowing for more recent technologies – especially digital technologies.

But while technologies are spreading across borders faster than ever, there remain many challenges in making technology diffusion work in developing economies and coordinated policy action is required to realize the full potential of new technologies.

PATENTSCOPE introduces verified SEP searches

WIPO has enhanced its global patent database, PATENTSCOPE, with the addition of a new feature allowing users to search for verified standard essential patents (SEPs).

The latest enhancement builds on “Declared SEPs” functionality introduced in 2025 which already enabled searches for patents that patentholders have declared as being potentially essential to a technical standard.

The new feature takes that initiative a step further by identifying patents that have been objectively verified as SEPs by independent experts on behalf of a patent pool administrator. The first patent pool administrator to provide verified essentiality data is Sisvel. WIPO is engaging with stakeholders to further expand verified data sources.

PCT Patent Prosecution Highway (PCT-PPH) pilots

ARIPO joins Global PPH pilot

On 6 January 2026, the African Regional Intellectual Property Organization (ARIPO) joined the Global Patent Prosecution Highway (GPPH) pilot, bringing the number of Offices taking part in the pilot to 29.

The GPPH makes it possible to request accelerated processing at any participating Office, based on work products (including, where applicable, a PCT written opinion from either the ISA or the IPEA, or an international preliminary report on patentability (IPRP) (Chapter II)) from any one of the other participating Offices, provided that at least one claim has been found to be patentable by the Office of earlier examination, and that any other applicable eligibility criteria are met. The pilot uses a single set of qualifying requirements and aims to simplify and improve the existing PPH network to make it more accessible to users.

WIPO Digital Access Service for Priority Documents

Under the Digital Access Service for Priority Documents (DAS), a PCT applicant can request the International Bureau (IB) to retrieve a copy of an earlier application from DAS for use as a priority document, instead of providing or arranging for the provision of a certified copy. Note that, in order to be able to make use of the DAS service, the Office with which the earlier application was filed needs to be a DAS depositing Office – not necessarily the receiving Office with which the international application is filed.

National Center of Intellectual Property (Belarus) becomes an Accessing and Depositing Office of DAS

The National Center of Intellectual Property (Belarus) has notified the IB that, with effect from 1 January 2026, it commenced operation as both a depositing and an accessing Office of the WIPO Digital Access Service. The corresponding DAS Notification is available at:

Practical Advice

Submitting amendments under PCT Article 34 after filing a demand for international preliminary examination

Q: I would like to file a demand for international preliminary examination together with amendments to the description and drawings. The time limit to file the demand is about to expire. Is it possible to obtain more time to submit the amendments if they are not ready?

A: International preliminary examination is an optional procedure that provides the only possibility during the international phase for an applicant to amend the description, claims and drawings of an international application. This possibility is provided by [PCT Article 34](#), which also provides the right for an applicant to communicate orally and in writing with the International Preliminary Examining Authority (IPEA). The examiner at the IPEA will therefore be able to consider amendments and arguments submitted by the applicant, and this may give the applicant further opportunities to make amendments, as provided by [PCT Rules 66.3](#) and [66.4](#), before the IPEA establishes the international preliminary examination report. By contrast, without filing a demand for international preliminary examination, an applicant has only one opportunity to amend the claims of an international application before the International Bureau under [PCT Article 19](#), where the amended claims are published but not considered during the international phase. International preliminary examination is often referred to as the procedure under Chapter II, as it is governed by Chapter II of the PCT.

The time limit to file a demand for international preliminary examination is either (i) three months from the date of the transmittal of the international search report (ISR) and the written opinion by the International Searching Authority (ISA) or (ii) 22 months from the priority date, whichever expires later ([PCT Rule 54bis.1\(a\)](#)).

Generally, the IPEA may start international preliminary examination as soon as it is in possession of the demand, the fees due, the ISR and the written opinion of the ISA, provided that any translation required under [PCT Rule 55.2](#) has been furnished. It is therefore advisable to file the demand and pay the applicable fees as soon as possible after you receive the results of the international search since the earlier the examination starts, the more time you will have to communicate with the examiner before the IPEA must establish its report. It is generally recommended to submit amendments and any arguments at the same time as filing the demand, noting that the IPEA need not take into account any amendments or arguments which it receives after it has begun to draw up its own written opinion or the report under [PCT Rule 66.4bis](#)).

If your amendments are not ready when the time limit under [PCT Rule 54bis.1\(a\)](#) to file a demand is about to expire, and you wish the international preliminary examination to start on the basis of the amendments, it is important to ensure that at least the demand is filed within the

time limit.² You should indicate in the demand that you wish the international preliminary examination to start on the basis of the description, claims or drawings as amended under [PCT Article 34](#) (Box No. IV of [Form PCT/IPEA/401](#)). If no such amendments have in fact been submitted, the IPEA will invite you to submit them within a time limit fixed in the invitation ([PCT Rule 60.1\(g\)](#)) (using [Form PCT/IPEA/431](#)). The IPEA will not start examination before it has received the amendments, or before the time limit fixed in the invitation has expired ([PCT Rules 60.1\(g\)](#) and [69.1\(e\)](#)). Please note that as this will delay the start of the examination, you may have less time to communicate with the examiner, noting that the IPEA must still establish the report within the time limit of [PCT Rule 69.2](#), that is (where any required translation has been furnished together with the demand), 28 months from the priority date or 6 months from the start of the examination, whichever expires last.

(Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) 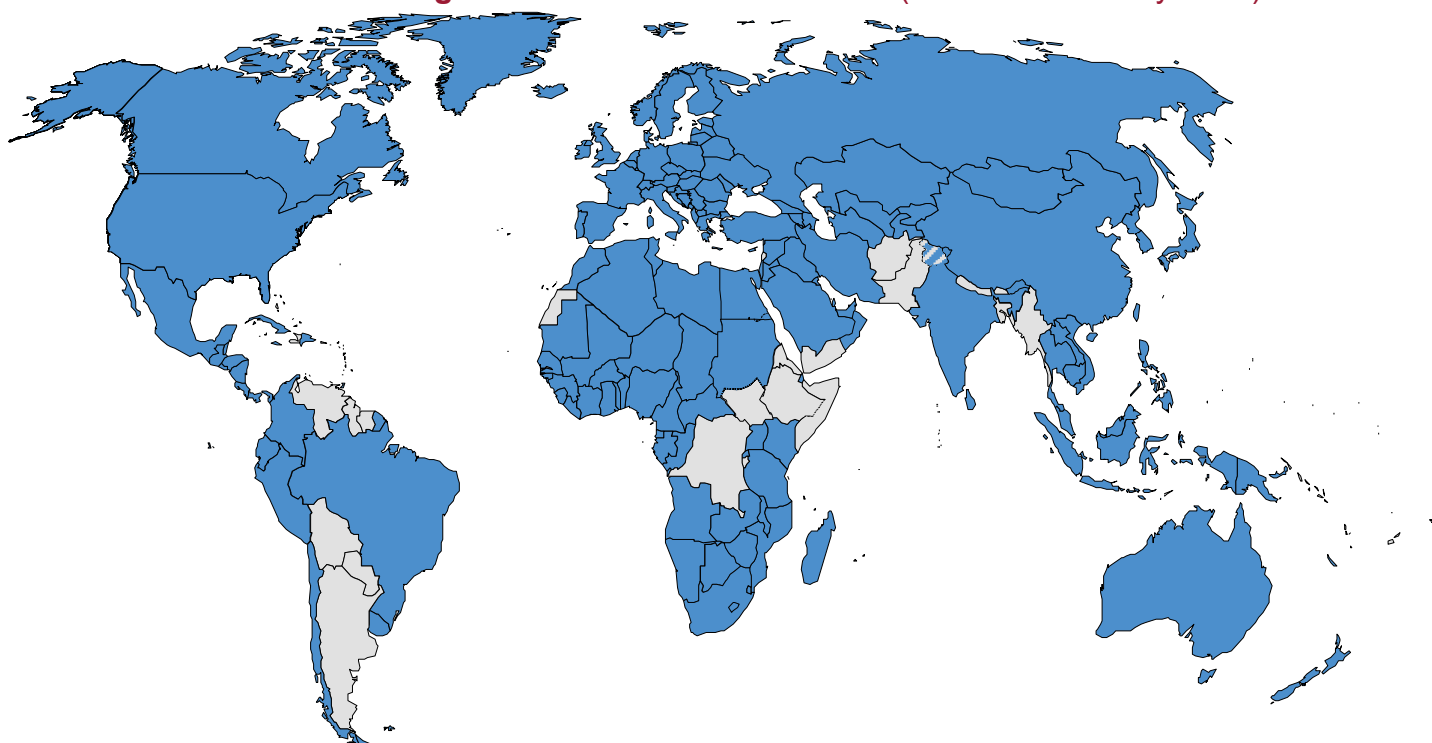

PCT filings rise again in 2025

International patent applications filed through the PCT system grew by 0.7% to reach 275,900 filings worldwide in 2025 – the second annual increase in a row.

As in 2024, information and communications technologies accounted for a significant share of activity. More than a fifth of all PCT applications related to digital communication (11.1%) and computer technology (9.6%), while filings for digital communication and semiconductors grew by 6.1% each.

China remained the leading origin of PCT filings with 73,718 applications (up 5.3% from 2024). Other top countries of origin included the United States of America (52,617 applications, -3.0% growth), Japan (47,922, -1.0%), the Republic of Korea (25,016, +4.9%) and Germany (16,441, -1.8%).

The top eight countries of origin all held the same positions in the rankings as in 2024. However, the Netherlands moved up one place to number 9 and Sweden advanced to the number 10 spot, with India falling from ninth in 2024 to 12th in 2025.

China-based telecommunications company Huawei Technologies had 7,523 PCT applications published during 2025, maintaining its status as leading PCT applicant for the ninth year running. Three of the other top 10 applicants were also from China along with three from the Republic of Korea, two from Japan and one from the United States of America. Jio Platforms Limited of India entered the global top 20 following a huge increase of 971 in its published PCT applications. Other applicants that entered or returned to the top 20 included NTT Docomo, Inc. (Japan), Nokia Technologies OY (Finland) and Beijing Zitiao Network Technology Co., Ltd (China).

Filing activity in the education sector was led by the University of California with 488 published PCT applications. Five other US institutions featured among the top 10 applicants from the sector, along with two universities from China and one each from Japan and the Republic of Korea.

International Exhibition of Inventions Geneva showcases global innovation

The 51st International Exhibition of Inventions Geneva has concluded successfully after five very busy days. Between 11 and 15 March 2026, inventors, investors, and the general public came together at Palexpo, Geneva, to explore more than 1,000 inventions from 35 countries and regions.

Alongside a hall full of exhibits, an extensive program of presentations and workshops was on offer, including a range of activities for children and young people.

More than 30,000 entries were recorded.

WIPO was once again one of the patrons of the Exhibition, and around 50 personnel from the Organization – including members of the PCT team – were on hand throughout to meet participants and offer expert advice on all aspects of intellectual property (IP) protection. WIPO shared a booth with the Swiss Federal Institute of Intellectual Property, and WIPO colleagues toured the hall to meet exhibitors and visitors.

The WIPO Prize at the Exhibition was awarded to MTR Corporation Ltd of Hong Kong SAR for its Acoustic GearGuard technology, which uses sound technology to monitor train parts without touching them.

IP leaders urge support for women innovators on International Women's Day

WIPO has joined scores of IP Offices around the world in calling for more action to advance participation by women and girls in creativity, innovation and IP.

In a joint statement issued to mark International Women's Day on 8 March, signatories highlighted the need to make IP systems accessible and ensure that women can own and control the commercial outcomes of their work.

Women are underrepresented in the IP ecosystem. According to WIPO's [World Intellectual Property Indicators 2025](#), only 18% of inventors listed in published PCT applications in 2024 were women. Policymakers in many countries are looking to close this gap as a critical part of efforts to enhance social justice, unlock potential, and drive economic growth and sustainable development.

The Office will accept international applications filed in electronic form using ePCT-Filing. Practical Advice

Options and consequences when the International Searching Authority finds a lack of unity of invention

Q: The International Searching Authority (ISA) has found that the PCT application I filed does not comply with the requirement of unity of invention. It has sent me partial search results with an invitation to pay additional fees within one month ([Form PCT/ISA/206](#)). I do not agree with this finding. What options do I have?

A: A PCT application must relate to one invention only or to a group of inventions so linked as to form a single general inventive concept ([PCT Articles 3\(4\)\(iii\)](#) and [17\(3\)\(a\)](#), [PCT Rule 13.1](#)). This is referred to in PCT terminology as “unity of invention.” Whether an application complies with the requirement of unity of invention must be determined in accordance with the

interpretation of unity of invention contained in [Annex B](#) of the Administrative Instructions under the PCT ([Section 206](#) of the Administrative Instructions). If the ISA considers that the international application does not comply with the requirement, it will initially search the parts of the international application which relate to the invention first mentioned in the claims (“the main invention”). Under [PCT Article 17\(3\)\(a\)](#), it will also invite the applicant to pay additional fees for each additional invention that has not been searched ([Form PCT/ISA/206](#)).

The invitation to pay additional fees that you have received should specify the reasons why the international application does not comply with the requirement of unity of invention, the amount of additional fees to be paid, and the date by which you must pay the fees, which is one month from the date of the invitation ([PCT Rule 40.1](#)). This time limit is strict and cannot normally be extended, noting that the ISA has a time limit for establishing the international search report and written opinion ([PCT Rules 42](#) and [43bis.1\(a\)](#)). If you would like the ISA to search the additional inventions, the fees must be paid within the time limit.

If you disagree with the determination of lack of unity of invention and would like to challenge the finding, you need to pay the additional fees for the inventions that you would like the ISA to search under protest ([PCT Rule 40.2\(c\)](#)). The protest is a statement which you submit to argue that your application complies with the requirement of unity of invention or that the amount of the required additional fees is excessive – in other words, you believe that there are fewer inventions or groups of inventions than the corresponding amount of additional fees requested. The ISA may charge a protest fee ([PCT Rule 40.2\(e\)](#)); if so, the ISA will also specify this in the invitation and you must also pay the protest fee within one month of receiving the invitation. The amounts of the applicable search fee and protest fee may be found in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annex D for those ISAs that charge them (not all ISAs require payment of a protest fee).

If the applicable protest fee is paid within the time limit, a review body constituted within the ISA will review the protest and, if it concludes that the protest is justified, will order total or partial reimbursement of the fees in question including any protest fee.¹ You may also request that the text of the protest and the related decision be notified to the designated Offices, but you will be required to furnish any translation of the text and decision that each designated Office may require ([PCT Rule 40.2\(c\)](#)).

The ISA will establish the international search report on the main invention and any parts of the international application relating to the other inventions for which the additional fees have been paid within the time limit ([PCT Article 17\(3\)\(a\)](#)). It will not search claims that in its view are not part of the main invention unless the additional fees have been paid in time. Nevertheless, all the claims, including those that have not been searched, will be included in the international application to be published and will be part of the application entering the national phase. Please also note that it is not possible to divide international applications during the international phase.

If you do not pay the additional fees, there is normally no other possibility of having the claims not relating to the main invention searched in the international phase. The International Preliminary Examining Authority (IPEA) is not obliged to examine claims that have not been searched ([PCT Rule 66.1\(e\)](#)) and in practice would not do so. Similarly, requesting a supplementary international search under [PCT Rule 45bis](#) will not enable you to have all claims

¹ Although an additional fee is required for each separate invention, only one protest fee is payable (where applicable), regardless of the number of additional search fees that you may have been invited to pay.

searched, since an Authority specified for supplementary search (SISA) may exclude from supplementary search any claims that were not the subject of the international search ([PCT Rule 45bis.5\(d\)](#)).

The consequences in relation to the unsearched claims will depend on the applicable national law. The law of a designated State may provide that, where the designated Office finds that the ISA's finding of lack of unity of invention was justified, the Office can consider those parts of the application that have not been searched to have been withdrawn with effect in the country concerned unless a special fee is paid to the Office ([PCT Article 17\(3\)\(b\)](#)). Under [Article 4\(G\)](#) of the Paris Convention, a designated State must also provide the applicant with the right to divide the patent application into divisional applications and preserve the date of the initial application and the benefit of any right of priority, although national law can specify the conditions where such divisions shall be authorized. For details on specific national requirements, please refer to the National Chapter for each Office in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*.

The following Tables show the amounts and currencies of the main PCT fees which are payable to the receiving Offices (ROs) and the International Preliminary Examining Authorities (IPEAs) during the international phase under Chapter I (Tables I(a) and I(b)) and under Chapter II (Table II). Fees which are payable only in particular circumstances are not shown; nor are details of certain reductions and refunds which may be available; such information can be found in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annexes C, D and E. Note that all amounts are subject to change due to variations in the fees themselves or fluctuations in exchange rates. The international filing fee may be reduced by CHF 100, 200 or 300 where the international application, or part of the international application, is filed in electronic form, as prescribed under Item 4(a), (b) and (c) of the Schedule of Fees (annexed to the Regulations under the PCT) and the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, paragraph 5.189. A 90% reduction in the international filing fee (including the fee per sheet over 30), the supplementary search handling fee and the handling fee, as well as an exemption from the transmittal fee payable to the International Bureau as receiving Office, is also available to applicants from certain States—refer to footnotes 2 and 14. (Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) The footnotes to the Fee Tables follow Table II.

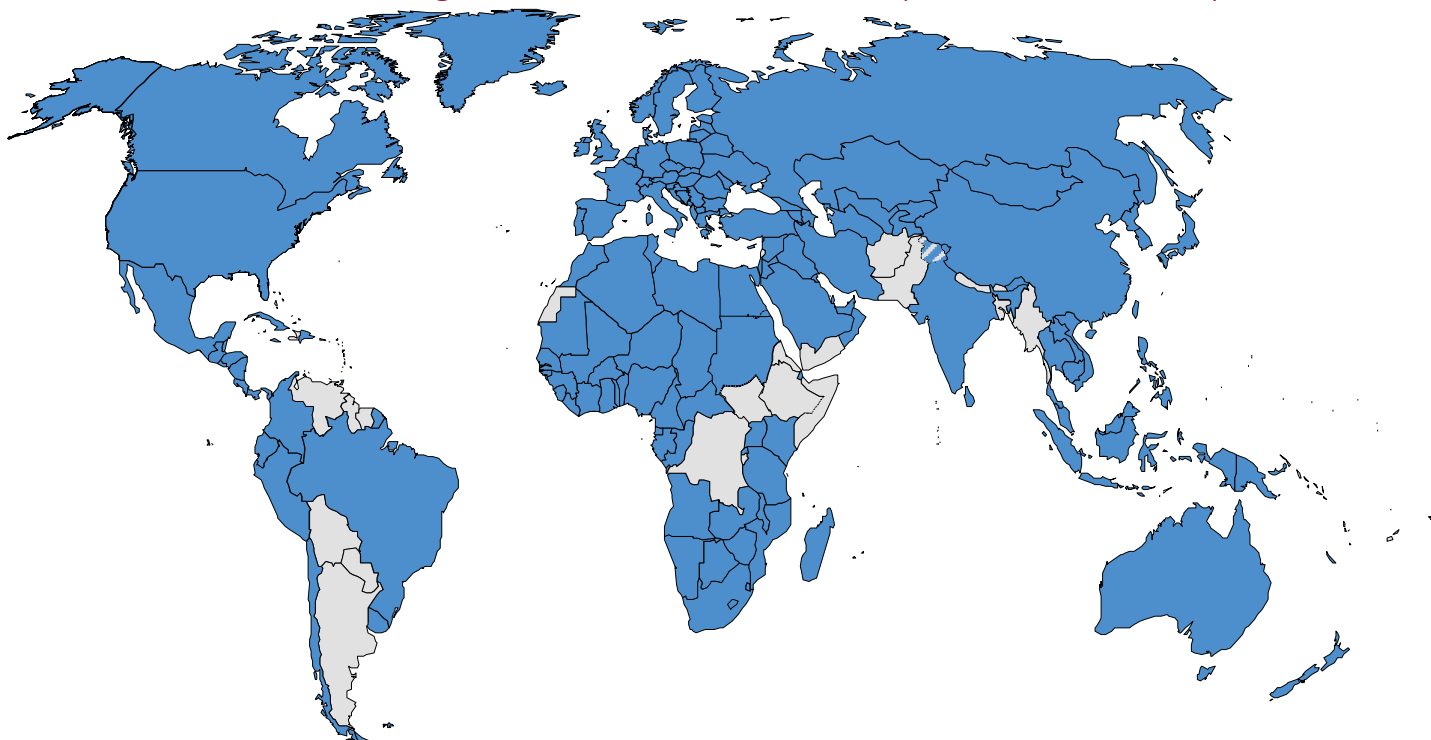

WIPO Member States reappoint Daren Tang as Director General

Singapore national will head Organization for another six years

Daren Tang has been reappointed Director General of the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) for a second consecutive six-year term.

Meeting in Extraordinary Session on 21 April, the General Assembly, the Paris Union Assembly and the Berne Union Assembly formally appointed Mr. Tang, in line with his nomination by the Organization's Coordination Committee. His new mandate will begin on 1 October.

Mr. Tang, a national of Singapore, has led WIPO since October 2020. Previously, he served as a senior official in the Singapore Government including five years as Chief Executive of the Intellectual Property Office of Singapore (IPOS).

Mr. Tang's priorities include leading the modernization of the PCT and other WIPO IP services, transforming customer service and harnessing digital technologies to improve efficiency and accessibility.

Republic of Moldova to join European Patent Organization

The Republic of Moldova is set to become the 40th Contracting State of the European Patent Organization (EPO) on 1 June 2026.

Any international application filed on or after that date will therefore include the designation of the Republic of Moldova for a European patent.

The Moldovan Parliament approved accession to the European Patent Convention (EPC) on 5 February 2026, and the country formally deposited its instrument of accession to the EPC on 25 March.

Warning: fraudulent emails impersonating WIPO and major IP Offices

WIPO is warning all IP holders including PCT users to watch out for a sophisticated email scam targeting patent and trademark applicants worldwide.

Certain unscrupulous persons are actively sending emails using fake addresses – including admin@wipo-office.com – to impersonate WIPO and other prominent intellectual property

offices, including the European Patent Office (EPO) and the European Union Intellectual Property Office (EUIPO).

These emails typically demand payments for patent or trademark-related services, falsely presenting themselves as official correspondence. Recipients may be led to believe that failure to pay could jeopardize the status of their intellectual property rights – a tactic designed to create urgency and pressure victims into transferring funds.

WIPO does not demand payments through unsolicited emails or request sensitive financial information via unofficial channels, and neither do the EPO or EUIPO.

While the PCT System has successfully implemented many measures to tackle the long-standing challenge of fraud, analysts are concerned that more sophisticated and ambitious scams pose a growing threat to IP services generally – as a [recent article](#) in *World Trademark Review* explains.

To protect yourself and your business:

- Check the sender's email address. WIPO email addresses always end with @wipo.int – however, email addresses can be "spoofed" so hover your cursor over the visible email address to make sure that the address remains the same.
- Do not click on any links or attachments in suspicious emails.
- Never make payments based solely on an unsolicited email request.
- Contact the relevant IP Office directly through their official website if you receive a suspicious communication.
- Report suspicious emails to your national cybersecurity authority and the impersonated organization.

Change to publication schedule of PCT applications

Publication of 14 May 2026

Thursday, 14 May 2026 will be a non-working day at WIPO. PCT applications as well as any *Official Notices (PCT Gazette)* which would normally have been published on that day will instead be published on Friday, 15 May 2026.

The date of completion of technical preparations for that publication will, however, remain unchanged, and any changes that should be taken into account for the purposes of international publication should be received by the International Bureau by midnight Central European Summer Time on Tuesday, 28 April 2026.

Long-serving PCT Legal and User Relations Division Director retires

Matthew Bryan leaves after more than three decades building the PCT System

The PCT is facing the end of an era with the departure at the end of April 2026 of Mr. Matthew Bryan, Director of the PCT Legal and User Relations Division at WIPO.

Mr. Bryan joined WIPO's PCT Legal Division as a lawyer in 1992, took up his current position 22 years ago and has played a significant role in the development of the PCT System throughout that time.

He shared the following farewell message with *Newsletter* readers:

I was a young lawyer in WIPO's PCT Legal Division when, in 1994, then Director Busso Bartels decided to start the *PCT Newsletter* as a mechanism for communicating regularly to PCT users around the world, to help keep them up to date on PCT-related developments. While several very dedicated colleagues have served as *Newsletter* editors over the last 32 years, I have now overseen its publication for more than two decades.

The PCT has seen very significant growth and development during my time at WIPO. When I first joined WIPO in 1992, there were between 50 and 60 PCT Contracting States, and fewer than 26,000 PCT applications were filed that year. As most of you will be aware, growth has been experienced in the intervening years in terms of both Contracting States (now 158) and numbers of applications filed (2025: 275,900).

I wanted to take this opportunity before I go to say thank you to the PCT user community: thank you for your faith in and use of the PCT System over these past many years, and thank you also for engaging with the staff of the PCT at WIPO. My PCT colleagues and I have appreciated the feedback you have provided to us in our surveys, during seminars, webinars and conferences, and also the thoughtful comments you have provided based on your PCT experience which have helped make the system work better and have enabled us to provide you with improved PCT-related resources.

I am also very grateful to the many dedicated WIPO PCT colleagues with whom I have had the privilege to work during these 33+ years; my WIPO PCT colleagues have been to me extraordinary examples of competence, professionalism and determination to provide excellent customer service.

With all that the PCT has accomplished over its almost 48-year history as an operational system, my colleagues and I are keenly aware that there is of course still much more to do – long-awaited legal framework improvements to be agreed and implemented, technical improvements to be facilitated, and work with PCT Member State Offices to be continued in order to try to ensure that the system works as it is supposed to. But my experience in the PCT at WIPO during all these years assures me that that the productive, constructive and diligent work of the PCT will continue in the very capable hands of my PCT colleagues at WIPO.

An entire copy of the sequence listing and identifying data should be contained within one XML file (compliant with WIPO Standard ST.26) on a single standard (ISO 9660) CD-ROM, CD-R, DVD, DVD-R or USB drive.

CL Chile (color drawings)

The National Institute of Industrial Property (Chile) now accepts color drawings under its national law, when they are necessary for a better understanding of the invention.

DE Germany (who can act as agent; national phase entry requirements)

The German Patent and Trademark Office has changed its requirements regarding who can act as agent before the Office, whether in its capacity as receiving Office or as designated (or elected) Office. The following persons may act as an agent:

- If an agent is required: any patent attorney, attorney-at-law, or firm of representatives established in Germany and authorized to represent the applicant in proceedings before the Office. In case of a firm of representatives, the natural person acting on its behalf must be authorized to render legal services in Germany.

Any patent attorney or attorney-at-law of a member State of the European Union, of a contracting party to the *Agreement on the European Economic Area*, or of Switzerland, authorized to practice in Germany, or to provide temporary services, and empowered to represent the applicant in proceedings before the Office (refer to the *Act on the Activities of European Patent Attorneys in Germany [EuPAG]* and the *Act on the Activities of European Lawyers in Germany [EuRAG]*);¹ under certain further requirements, any firm of representatives established in a member State of the

European Union, in a State that is a contracting party to the *Agreement on the European Economic Area* or in a member State of the World Trade Organization. The natural person acting on its behalf must be authorized to render legal services in Germany.

- If an agent is not required: as mentioned above, and any natural person.

In addition, the Office has changed its requirements for entry into the national phase: where the applicant expressly requests an earlier start of the national phase under PCT Article 23(2), the applicant may be asked to send a copy of the international application, unless the international application was filed with the German Patent and Trademark Office as receiving Office. If amendments of the claims were filed under PCT Article 19, the applicant may be asked to send a copy of those amendments.

ES Spain (provisional protection; exemptions, reductions or refunds of national fee; requirements concerning the deposit of microorganisms and other biological material)

The Spanish Patent and Trademark Office has clarified its requirements concerning provisional protection after international publication. The relevant provisions of its national law include Articles 170.2 and 67 of Law No. 24/2015 on Patents and the requirements are as follows:

If the international application has been published in Spanish, the provisional protection shall take effect in Spain with respect to that application from the date of international publication. If it has been published in another language, the provisional protection shall take effect from the date on which its translation into Spanish is made available to the public at the Spanish Patent and Trademark Office. For this purpose, a notice of the date from which the translation of the application is made available to the public shall be published in the *Official Industrial Property Bulletin*.

If the applicant does not reside in Spain or in a country of the European Union, the translation must be either prepared by a patent attorney entitled to practice before the Office, or certified by a sworn translator appointed by the Ministry of External Affairs of Spain. In addition, persons who declare to have linguistic and technical knowledge in

accordance with the Ministerial Order ETU/320/2018 of March 26, 2018 may also prepare the translation.

That provisional protection consists of the right to demand compensation, reasonable and appropriate to the circumstances, from any third party who, between the date the translation into Spanish has been published and the date of publication of the mention that the patent has been granted, has made use of the invention which after that period would be prohibited by virtue of the patent.

It is understood that the patent application has never provided provisional protection when it has been or is considered to have been withdrawn, or when it has been refused or revoked by virtue of a final decision.

The Office has also changed the conditions for exemptions, reductions or refunds of the national fee, which are now as follows:

Practical advice

Using the PCT to seek other kinds of protection for an invention than a patent

Q. I have been granted a patent in my home country. I am interested in extending protection to other markets but expect to obtain only very limited funding, and some markets are of lesser interest. Is it possible to use the PCT to obtain other kinds of protection than a patent in some countries?

Titles of protection other than a patent can be sought through the PCT where a territory’s national or regional law provides for alternative types of protection for inventions. One common alternative to a patent is the utility model and there are other forms of protection similar to utility models, such as a certificate/patent of addition or an inventor’s certificate.

Applicable national or regional procedures for obtaining and maintaining a utility model are usually simpler, cheaper and faster, with less or no substantive examination required. Certain requirements, such as inventive step, may be less stringent or absent. However, utility models offer a shorter term of protection than patents. Because there is less or no substantive

examination, a utility model is typically not as “strong” as a patent and provides less legal certainty with regard to validity.

The detailed features of each alternative form of protection for inventions will depend on the particular national system. In some countries, a utility model can be obtained only for product inventions and only in limited fields of technology, while technical, chemical and biological processes may not be eligible for such protection.

Importantly, while the PCT System enables you to seek alternative forms of protection for inventions, it does *not* cover other intellectual property rights such as trademarks and industrial designs. WIPO offers other systems of international protection for such IP rights, for example the [Madrid System](#) for trademarks and the [Hague System](#) for industrial designs.

When you file an international application through the PCT, the filing of the PCT request constitutes the automatic and all-inclusive coverage of all designations available under the PCT on the international filing date, for every kind of protection available for each country concerned ([PCT Articles 2\(ii\)](#), [43](#) and [44](#), and [Rule 4.9\(a\)](#)), and, where applicable, in respect of both regional and national patents ([PCT Article 45](#) and [Rule 4.9\(a\)\(ii\)](#)).

During the international phase of the PCT procedure, you do not need to make any indication relating to the title of protection and there is no such possibility in the request form or ePCT. You may keep your options open until you enter the national phase; it is only before each designated Office that you select the specific type of protection. Fees in the international phase are the same whichever type of protection you eventually plan to seek.

However, if you wish a PCT application to be treated as a patent of addition, certificate of addition, inventor’s certificate of addition or utility certificate of addition ([PCT Rule 4.11\(a\)\(i\)](#)), or a continuation or continuation-in-part of an earlier application ([PCT Rule 4.11\(a\)\(ii\)](#)), certain indications may be required at the time of filing.

Information on the available titles of protection by Office can be found in the table [Types of Protection Available via the PCT in PCT Contracting States](#) and in the National Chapters of the [PCT Applicant’s Guide](#). Further information on laws relating to alternative forms of protection in different countries can be found in the [WIPO Lex](#) database, and some basic information and frequently asked questions (FAQs) on utility models are available on WIPO’s webpage on [utility models](#).

A few countries allow you to choose more than one type of protection and in such cases you may be required to indicate to the designated Office which type of protection is sought primarily ([PCT Rule 49bis.1\(b\)](#)). In some jurisdictions, utility model and patent protection may be complementary rather than alternatives, potentially enabling you to obtain a utility model while waiting for the grant of a patent. Furthermore, some countries provide for the possibility of converting from one type of protection to another ([PCT Rule 49bis.2\(b\)](#)).

Some countries which are members of regional patent organizations provide for a type of protection other than a patent but have “closed the national route”. This means that the State may be designated only for a regional patent and such other types of protection cannot be obtained via the PCT for the country concerned. For example, France has closed the national route with the result that a *certificat d’invention* can only be requested through a direct national application in France. The above-mentioned table and the *PCT Applicant’s Guide* do not include any types of protection that cannot be obtained via the PCT.

Where the local patent system provides for a choice of kinds of protection, you need to carefully examine and compare their specific features to determine which would be more suitable for your invention, and in which market. For example, if you have made an improvement to an existing product which may not be considered to be sufficiently inventive to be patentable, or the product concerned is expected to have a short life cycle, a utility model or similar kind of protection may be an interesting alternative, if such protection is available in your target markets.

The following Tables show the amounts and currencies of the main PCT fees which are payable to the receiving Offices (ROs) and the International Fees which are payable only in particular circumstances are not shown; nor are details of certain reductions and refunds which may be available; such information can be found in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annexes C, D and E. Note that all amounts are subject to change due to variations in the fees themselves or fluctuations in exchange rates. The international filing fee may be reduced by CHF 100, 200 or 300 where the international application, or part of the international application, is filed in electronic form, as prescribed under Item 4(a), (b) and (c) of the Schedule of Fees (annexed to the Regulations under the PCT) and the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, paragraph 5.189. A 90% reduction in the international filing fee (including the fee per sheet over 30), the supplementary search handling fee and the handling fee, as well as an exemption from the transmittal fee payable to the International Bureau as receiving Office, is also available to applicants from certain States—refer to footnotes 2 and 14. (Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) The footnotes to the Fee Tables follow Table II.

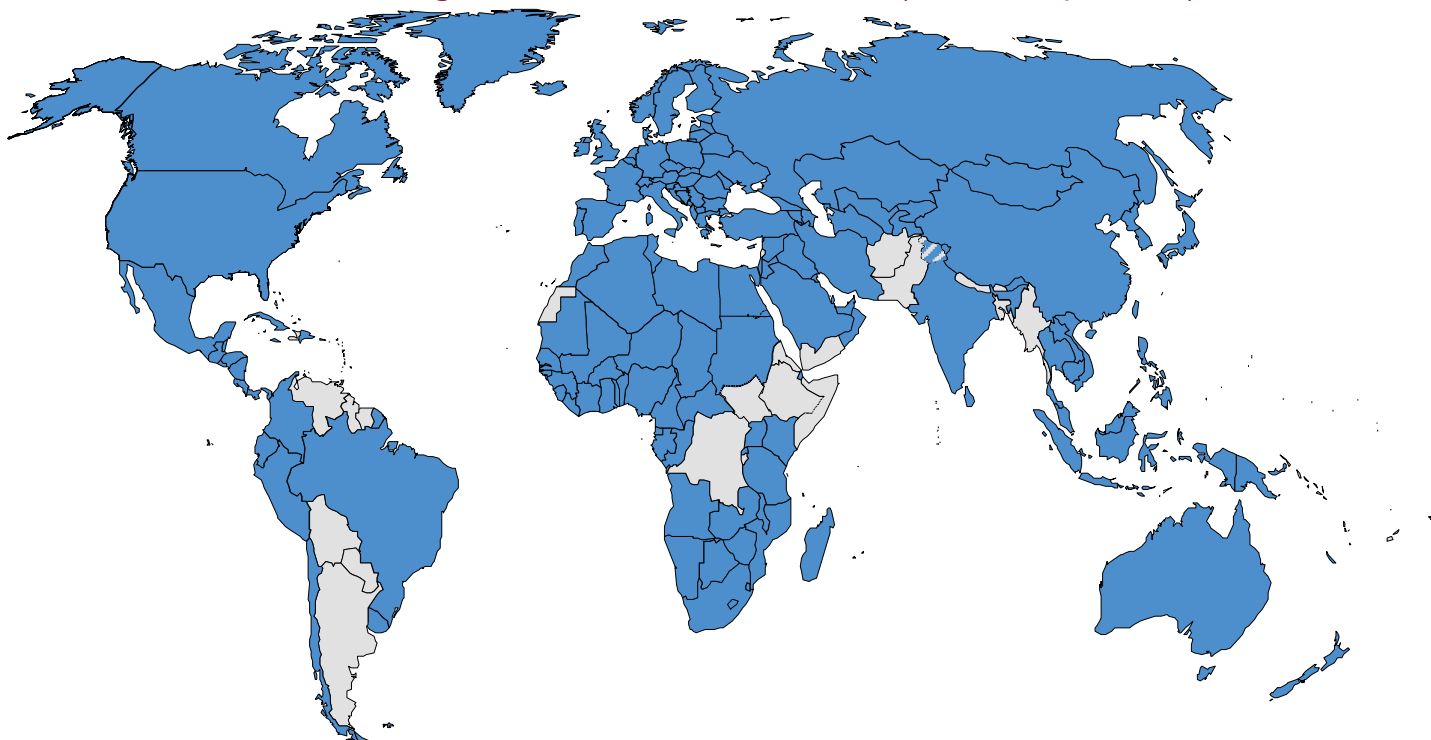

The Bahamas joins the PCT

Accession on 19 August will bring Treaty membership to 159 States

The Bahamas is set to become the 159th Contracting State of the PCT. The country deposited its instrument of accession with WIPO on 19 May 2026, and will become bound by the Treaty from 19 August.

From that date, applicants and inventors in The Bahamas will be able to file patent applications under the PCT as a means of seeking patent protection in all

PCT Contracting States. And foreign innovators and companies will be able to use the PCT System to seek patent protection for their inventions in The Bahamas.



Lisa Jorgenson, WIPO's Deputy Director General, Patents and Technology Sector, commented: "The Patent Cooperation Treaty continues to expand its global reach. The Bahamas joins a growing number of PCT members in the Caribbean – strengthening the region's global economic integration and competitiveness. I look forward to seeing how this new development opens up opportunities for inventors and businesses, both in The Bahamas and beyond."

European Patent Office enables use of ePCT for electronic notifications

From 1 June 2026, all users of the European Patent Office (EPO) will be able to use WIPO's ePCT online service to receive electronic notifications of PCT communications issued by the EPO.

The new feature is the result of close cooperation between the EPO and WIPO and will allow PCT users to choose a faster, more secure digital alternative to paper-based notifications. It will apply to communications issued by the EPO in its capacity as receiving Office (after transmittal

of the record copy to the International Bureau (IB)), International Searching Authority or International Preliminary Examining Authority.

To use the new service, EPO users must have a WIPO account and must indicate their consent to receiving electronic notifications for each PCT application filed, either at the time of filing (using Form PCT/RO/101) or at a later stage.

Users who have opted for the service will be able to retrieve communications directly in ePCT relating to applications for which they have consented to such notification. They will receive an email containing a link to view and download documents in ePCT. No paper copies of PCT communications will be sent. Each document sent electronically will be deemed to be delivered on the date shown on the document.

For the time being, notification via ePCT will not be available for communications issued by the EPO as an Authority specified for supplementary search under PCT Rule 45*bis* or for communications issued by the EPO as receiving Office before the record copy is transmitted to the IB.

New WIPO publications shed light on patent activity in two economic sectors

Reports underscore value of innovation in sport and heavy-duty road transport

The sports industry is a boom area for patents and other forms of intellectual property, according to new research from WIPO.

More than 65,700 sports-related inventions were recorded globally between 2016 and 2025, with patents rising by 7.6% annually – far above the 4.4% average growth rate in filings across all sectors.

The *WIPO Technology SPARK report on Sports Technology*, released as part of World IP Day celebrations, analyzes patents, trademarks and designs to reveal patterns of inventive activity, commercialization and design-led differentiation across different territories and sports.

Report on SEP valuation methods set to launch

WIPO has developed a new report examining the economic valuation methods used to assess fair, reasonable and non-discriminatory (FRAND) licensing terms in the field of standard essential patents (SEPs).

Valuation Methods in Licensing Standard Essential Patents will be presented live at an online launch event at 15:00 Geneva time on Thursday, 4 June.

Policies often require that SEPs be licensed on FRAND terms. However, translating that high-level undertaking into concrete licensing terms can be challenging. WIPO's new report sets out the principal approaches to FRAND determination and their strengths and limitations, to enhance stakeholders' understanding and support better informed negotiations and dispute settlement in SEP licensing.

Republic of Moldova joining European Patent Organisation – more information

Previous validation agreement to cease effect from 1 June 2026

As reported in last month's edition of the *Newsletter*, the Republic of Moldova is acceding to the European Patent Convention (EPC) and will become the 40th Contracting State of the European Patent Organisation on 1 June 2026.

The European Patent Office (EPO) has now published a [notice](#) confirming the effect of the Republic of Moldova's accession to the EPC.

Any international application filed on or after 1 June 2026 will include the designation of the Republic of Moldova for a European patent. From that date, nationals and residents of the Republic of Moldova will be able to file international applications with the EPO as receiving Office, in addition to the International Bureau of WIPO.

The validation agreement between the Republic of Moldova and the European Patent Organisation will terminate with the entry into force of the EPC in the Republic of Moldova on 1 June 2026. From that date it will no longer be possible to validate European patent applications and patents in the Republic of Moldova. The validation system will, however, continue to apply to European and international applications filed prior to 1 June 2026, as well as to European patents granted in respect of such applications.

WIPO Digital Access Service for Priority Documents

Under the Digital Access Service for Priority Documents (DAS), a PCT applicant can ask the International Bureau to retrieve a copy of an earlier application from DAS for use as a priority document, instead of providing or arranging for the provision of a certified copy. For an applicant to be able to make use of the DAS service, the Office with which the earlier application was filed needs to be a DAS depositing Office – not necessarily the receiving Office with which the international application is filed.

CZ Czechia

The Industrial Property Office of the Czech Republic will participate in DAS, both as a depositing and as an accessing Office, with effect from 1 July 2026.

IE Ireland

The Intellectual Property Office of Ireland has participated in DAS as an accessing Office since 17 February 2022. It has now also begun participating as a depositing Office, with effect since 11 May 2026.

LU Luxembourg

The Intellectual Property Office (Luxembourg) has notified the IB that it started participating in DAS, both as a depositing and as an accessing Office, with effect since 1 December 2025.

Practical Advice

Using the PCT to seek regional patents

Q. The ePCT system for filing a PCT application shows some Contracting States as designations for a national patent only, some for a regional patent only, and others for both a national and a regional patent. Could you please explain how this distinction works and why it matters. What are the consequences for obtaining patent protection?

The PCT System streamlines and simplifies procedures for obtaining patent protection in multiple countries. Additional advantages may result from its combined use with regional patent systems.

Under [PCT Article 45](#), regional patent treaties and national laws may allow PCT applicants to seek regional patents through the PCT. Four regional treaties currently have such arrangements: the Protocol on Patents and Industrial Designs within the framework of the African Regional Intellectual Property Organization (ARIPO), the Eurasian Patent Convention (EAPC), the European Patent Convention (EPC), and the Agreement establishing the African Intellectual Property Organization (OAPI).¹

As mentioned in last month's Practical Advice, the filing of a PCT request constitutes automatic and all-inclusive coverage of all designations available under the PCT on the international filing date, for every kind of protection available for each country concerned ([PCT Articles 2\(ii\)](#), [43](#) and [44](#), and [Rule 4.9\(a\)](#)). Such designation also covers both national and regional patents, where applicable ([PCT Article 45](#) and [Rule 4.9\(a\)\(iii\)](#)).

During the international phase you do not need to make any indication as regards seeking regional or national patents; you may keep your options open as to whether you will enter the regional phase before the regional Office for countries which are members of one of the above-mentioned regional treaties or the national phase before the relevant national Office, where that is possible. Note that some countries have "closed the national route", meaning that the State concerned may be designated only for a regional patent; currently this is the case with some EPC and all OAPI States.

The characteristics of regional patent systems vary. Whereas the EPC and ARIPO allow you, when entering the regional phase, to select those States within the regional system where you wish to obtain patent protection, the EAPC and OAPI systems designate all States and it is not possible to omit any State from the designation.

Where you have the choice between seeking national patents or a regional one in the markets you are interested in, you will need to compare the two routes to determine which would be more advantageous in your particular situation. In doing so, you should take into account the applicable laws on patentability as well as the costs of and procedures for obtaining, maintaining and enforcing patent rights, among other considerations.

¹ Another regional patent system operates through the Patent Office of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC). A GCC patent cannot be obtained via the PCT, as neither the regional treaty nor any of the national laws of its member States currently provide for such possibility under Article 45. However, all six GCC member countries are PCT Contracting States and are designated for national patents.

The decision process will be essentially the same as for any national phase entries. The National Chapters of the [PCT Applicant's Guide](#) contain information on time limits and requirements for entry into the national/regional phase, and special requirements under national laws. Please refer to the WIPO website for tables showing the [PCT Contracting States for which a regional patent can be obtained via the PCT](#), the [types of protection available in different Contracting States](#) and the [time limits for entering the national/regional phase](#) across all Offices.

In addition, it should be noted that although different applicants may be indicated for different States designated for a regional patent in a PCT application, where a particular State has been designated for both a national patent and a regional patent, the same applicant or applicants must be indicated for both designations ([Section 203\(b\)](#) of the Administrative Instructions under the PCT).

Concerning fees, there may be exemptions or reductions if the national or regional phase is entered before an Office that has already performed the international search or international preliminary examination. These are strategic considerations that you may already need to take into account when you file a PCT application, if there is more than one International Searching Authority specified as competent for the searching of international applications by the receiving Offices where you may file an international application.

As for where to enter the national phase, you should consider your business needs first and foremost, but you may also wish to consider criteria such as efficiency of procedures, any scope for accelerated processing or work-sharing arrangements (for example, [Patent Prosecution Highway agreements](#)), availability of remedies to correct mistakes made in the international phase, alternative dispute resolution mechanisms, and so on.

In addition, further specificities may apply in relation to particular regions. To take just one example: if and when a European patent has been granted, patent owners may request unitary effect of that patent for the territory of any EPC States that are also members of the European Union (EU) and participate in the Unitary Patent system. That means uniform protection and simplified judicial enforcement procedures before the Unified Patent Court (UPC). For more information, visit the [EPO website](#).

Note that all amounts are subject to change due to variations in the fees themselves or fluctuations in exchange rates. The international filing fee may be reduced by CHF 100, 200 or 300 where the international application, or part of the international application, is filed in electronic form, as prescribed under Item 4(a), (b) and (c) of the Schedule of Fees (annexed to the Regulations under the PCT) and the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, paragraph 5.189. A 90% reduction in the international filing fee (including the fee per sheet over 30), the supplementary search handling fee and the handling fee, as well as an exemption from the transmittal fee payable to the International Bureau as receiving Office, is also available to applicants from certain States—refer to footnotes 2 and 14. (Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) The footnotes to the Fee Tables follow Table II.

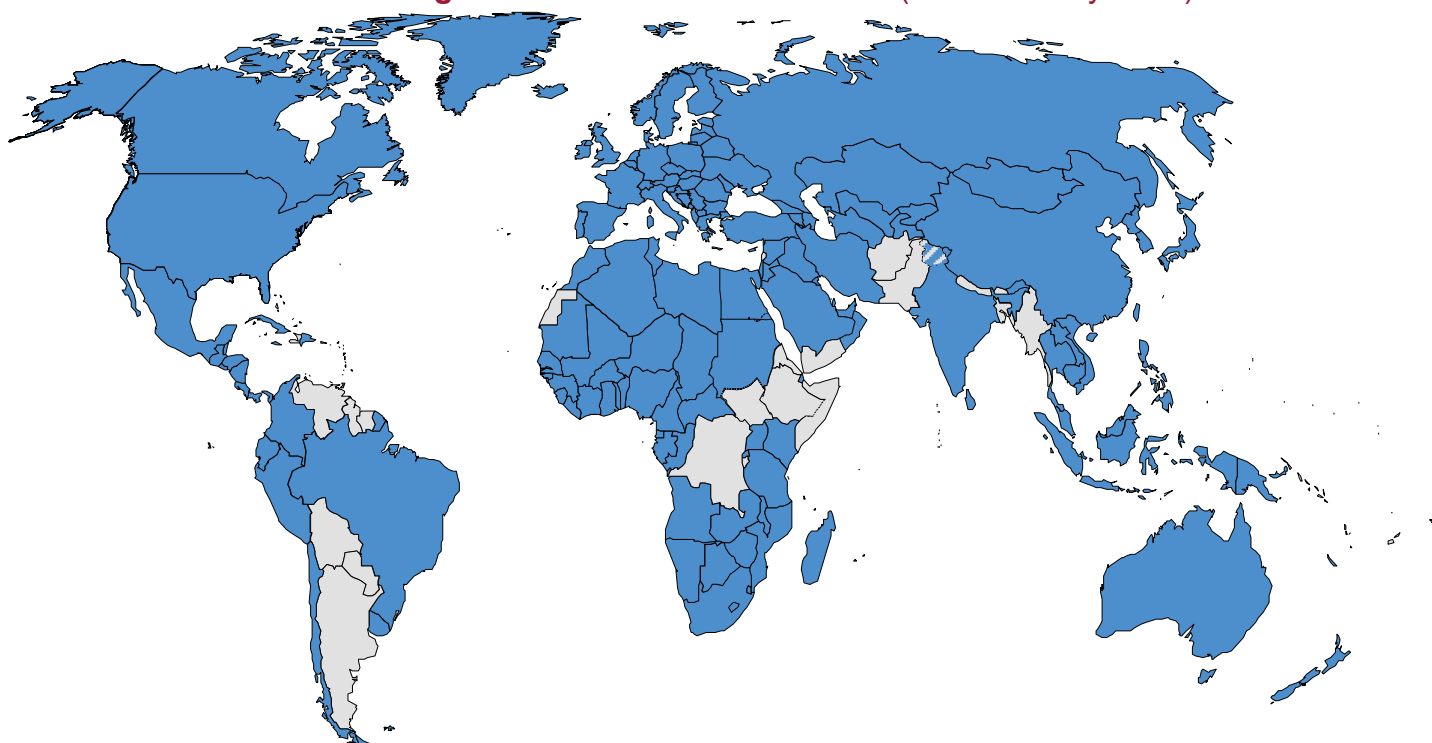

PCT Yearly Review 2026 now available

Report offers rich data on PCT filings, national phase entry and PCT System performance

WIPO has published the *PCT Yearly Review 2026*, the latest edition of its annual in-depth statistical analysis of patenting activity through the PCT system.

The *Review* expands on the 2025 PCT filings data that were reported in the March issue of the *PCT Newsletter*. In addition to 30 figures and tables analyzing international applications, it also includes information about national phase entries in 2024 (the latest year for which data are available).

Detailed filing data show that women accounted for 18.1% of all inventors named in PCT applications in 2025. However, the share of women inventors has risen steadily over the past 15 years, increasing by 6.7 percentage points in total since 2011.

The report also reveals that PCT national phase entries fell by 3.7% in 2024 – the second consecutive year of decline. PCT national phase entries accounted for 53.3% of non-resident patent applications filed worldwide.

Almost all PCT applications (99.4%) in 2025 were filed electronically, with 44.5% being filed through the ePCT service. The International Bureau (IB) performed the PCT-required formalities examination for 81.3% of PCT applications within one week of receipt and for 95.6% within two weeks, while receiving Offices took 2.7 weeks on average to transmit a PCT application to the IB. Both these metrics reflect significant improvements in Office performance since the baseline reporting year of 2011.

PCT SME Support Series (No. 3): How to use the PCT timeline strategically

Q: I run a small business and would like to seek patent protection for an important invention without delay. At the same time, we are still testing the product, speaking with investors and potential partners, and deciding where we may launch, manufacture or license the invention. I understand that the PCT gives us more time to decide where to seek patent protection. How should we use that time?

The PCT legal framework sets out a timeline of procedural steps that underpin the PCT System. To use the PCT successfully, you need to follow those procedures; thus, adhering to the timeline and meeting time limits for actions is a matter of legal compliance. But it also makes sense to treat the timeline as a practical business planning tool. Properly understood, it can help you structure and schedule some critical strategic decisions. To realize the full potential of the PCT, you need to know where the PCT System provides flexibility as well as risk and cost management opportunities.

The PCT is a patent filing system rather than a patent granting system. An international application does not result in the grant of an “international patent”. Whether or not protection is granted for your invention will be decided by each national or regional Office in the territories where you have chosen to seek protection. But once an international filing date has been accorded, your PCT application has the legal effect of a regular national application in each designated (i.e., chosen) State.

When you file a PCT application, generally all PCT Contracting States are designated automatically. You can wait until a later stage in the process – known as the national phase – to specify the States in which you wish to further seek protection. This means that you defer most processing, examination, translation and legal advisors’ costs to a later time.

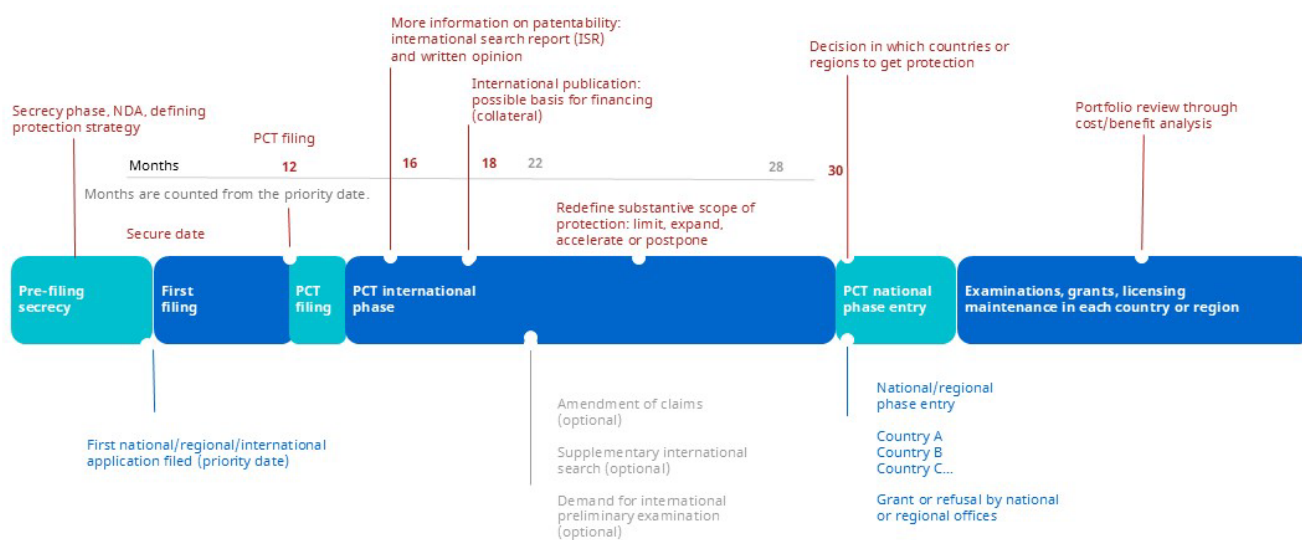
Your PCT application gives you a clear schedule for choosing the territories in which you wish to seek protection. National phase entry can involve significant costs, so in deciding where to seek protection, you need to weigh those costs against the potential commercial benefits of protection in each market. Understanding the PCT timeline should help you focus on the relevant decisions at each stage of the process.

Figure 1 shows a typical PCT timeline for SMEs. It may look complicated, but do not worry. Your legal advisor can guide you through the necessary formalities, and in using the PCT you or your legal advisor will also receive a series of notifications and PCT forms from the International Bureau and other Offices alerting you to necessary actions (for more information on this, see the [Practical Advice](#) article below). Alongside the main legal and administrative steps involved in filing through the PCT, Figure 1 also highlights some key practical planning questions for SMEs. These are explained in more detail in Table 1 below. You need to understand a few key points about the filing process:

- Months in the timeline are counted from the priority date. Most users begin by filing one or several national or regional patent application(s), then file a PCT application within 12 months, claiming priority from the earlier application(s). The priority date will be the filing date of the earliest application whose priority is claimed, or the international filing date if no earlier priority is claimed.

- In a typical case where a PCT application is filed at the end of the priority year, the international search report (ISR) and the written opinion of the International Searching Authority will generally become available around 16 months from the priority date. These two documents can help inform your decisions. The ISR identifies relevant prior art, while the written opinion provides a preliminary, non-binding view on whether the invention appears to meet certain patentability criteria including novelty, inventive step and industrial applicability.
- WIPO will normally publish your international application shortly after the expiration of 18 months from the priority date, unless you have withdrawn it beforehand.
- In the vast majority of Offices, national or regional phase entry is usually due within 30 or 31 months from the priority date. However, you should always check the applicable time limit and requirements for each Office. You should also know that you can enter the national phase early and separately for each country and region.
- Figure 1 also shows optional international phase procedures. For example, amendments to the claims under [PCT Article 19](#), supplementary international search and a demand for international preliminary examination under [Chapter II of the PCT](#) may be relevant in some cases. A Chapter II demand is generally due within three months from transmittal of the ISR and written opinion or 22 months from the priority date, whichever date is later, while the corresponding international preliminary report will generally be established later in the international phase – shown around 28 months in the timeline.

Figure 1: PCT timeline for SMEs



The timeline is simplified for SME planning; exact time limits and national requirements should be checked for each application.

From a business perspective, you need to consider a second, more fundamental set of issues alongside the legal and formal requirements that patenting entails. Table 1 identifies key business issues at different stages of the timeline.

Table 1: Key business issues at different stages of the PCT timeline

Timing	PCT/legal layer	SME/business layer
Before disclosure	No PCT step yet. Prepare first filing if patent protection is intended.	Keep technical information confidential (need to know); check and use non-disclosure agreements (NDAs); confirm ownership by founders, employees, consultants, contractors, research partners or possible co-applicants; consider what should be filed and what may remain know-how or trade secret.
First filing and priority year	File a first national or regional application. File a PCT application within 12 months from the priority date, if priority is to be claimed.	Use months 0–12 to review the business case, likely markets, competitors, materials for investors and partners, and budget. Patent information searches by Offices or from your side may be relevant before the first filing or early in the process; a separate freedom-to-operate review may be needed before selling in a particular market.
After PCT filing and international search	In a typical case where the PCT application is filed at the end of the priority year, the international search report (ISR) and written opinion may become available around 16 months from the priority date. Optional procedures may also be considered, including Article 19 amendments to the claims, supplementary international search and a demand for international preliminary examination under PCT Chapter II.	Read the search results (ISR and written opinion) as decision input: refine patent claims, reassess risks, update materials for investors or partners, and decide whether the strategy should be broader, narrower or faster. Prepare for public disclosure or – in rare cases – keeping the invention further secret, working the invention further, by withdrawing all applications related to the invention. You could always apply again with a refined invention as long as it stays entirely unpublished.
International publication and optional Chapter II	If not withdrawn, the application is normally published shortly after 18 months from the priority date and becomes accessible through the open-access PATENTSCOPE database. A demand for international preliminary examination under PCT Chapter II is generally due by whichever date is later: three months from transmittal of the ISR and written opinion or 22 months from the priority date. The Chapter II report is shown at around 28 months in the timeline.	If you are considering filing a demand under Chapter II, decide whether international preliminary examination may help before national or regional phase entry. For business purposes, you may want to prioritize early examination with a view to accelerating processing in other jurisdictions based on examination progress. This will provide you with clarity while retaining flexibility on geographical protection and deferring significant national and regional costs.
Before national/regional phase	For many Offices, national or regional phase entry is usually due within 30 months from the priority date, but deadlines and requirements vary by Office. If you do not enter national phase within the time limit, the PCT will cease to have effect.	Because all PCT Contracting States are automatically designated upon filing, the decision on where to enter the national or regional phase can generally be deferred until closer to the applicable deadline. Select countries by business case, considering customers, competitors, manufacturing, partners, licensing, enforcement, translation and local agent costs, regulatory timing and funding runway. You may want to accelerate examinations in certain countries based on PCT Patent Prosecution Highway (PCT-PPH) Agreements.
After national/regional phase entry	Each national or regional Office examines the application under its own law and decides whether to grant protection.	Periodically review your portfolio of applications in process and granted patents: decide whether maintenance fees remain justified; consider licensing or assignment opportunities; and verify official communications or payment requests.

Key takeaway

For SMEs, the PCT timeline is not just a list of legal deadlines. It can also serve as a practical planning and risk management tool. Use it to keep options open before publication, test markets, review search results, select countries more carefully and avoid unnecessary costs before national or regional phase entry.

Practical Advice

Communications usually received from Offices during the international phase under Chapter I of the PCT

Q: I've just filed a PCT application. What communications will I receive during the international phase, assuming no defects in formalities are found in my application?

A: After you have filed an international application under the PCT, you will receive a range of notifications, invitations and other communications from the receiving Office (RO), the International Bureau (IB) and the International Searching Authority (ISA). In ordinary circumstances – that is, where no formalities defect has been found in the PCT application as submitted – you will receive the communications outlined below. (Note that this overview does not cover communications relating to international preliminary examination under Chapter II of the PCT.)

You need to carefully monitor the arrival of each communication and check its content. Make sure that the data it contains match your internal records. Do not wait until the application has been published to detect and correct errors, as some important time limits for remedial actions will have expired by that time.

PCT/RO/105 Notification of the international application number and of the international filing date

If the conditions for according an international filing date are fulfilled on the date on which the receiving Office receives the application, the receiving Office will accord that date as the international filing date and notify the applicant ([PCT Article 11\(1\)](#) and [Rule 20.2](#)). You need to check that you receive this important notification, which is usually issued within the first month after the application has been filed. Make sure the accorded filing date is the date you expected and that other information in the notification is correct; if not, you need to consider requesting corrections following the applicable procedures.

PCT/RO/150 Invitation to furnish translation

Where a PCT application has been filed in a language which is not accepted by the competent ISA, you need to furnish a translation into a language accepted by that ISA within one month from the filing date. If a translation has not yet been furnished, the RO will invite you to do so. The procedure is outlined in [PCT Rule 12.3](#).

PCT/RO/102 Notification concerning payment of prescribed fees

The transmittal fee, international filing fee and international search fee must be paid within one month after filing ([PCT Rules 14](#), [15](#) and [16](#)). Generally, you will receive this notification concerning payment together with the notification of the international filing date. Any electronic filing system will have calculated the amounts in question. This notification indicates any balance due; you should check the figure and pay it as soon as possible, bearing in mind that the RO will not transmit a copy of the application (the search copy) to the ISA until the search fee has been paid ([PCT Rule 23.1\(a\)](#)). If all due fees are not paid within the month, the RO will issue Form [PCT/RO/133](#): *Invitation to pay with a late payment fee*, applying the procedure outlined in [PCT Rule 16bis](#).

PCT/IB/301 Notification of receipt of record copy

The IB should notify you that it has received from the RO – after any national security clearance that may be required – a copy of the international application (the record copy) ([PCT Rules 22.1](#) and [24.2](#)). The record copy will be used for international publication and other processing of the application at the IB.

PCT/ISA/202 Notification of receipt of search copy

The ISA should notify you of the date on which it has received the search copy, based on which it will perform the international search ([PCT Rules 23](#) and [25](#)). The international search report and the written opinion of the ISA will usually be established within three months from this date.

PCT/ISA/220 Notification of transmittal of the international search report (ISR) and the written opinion of the ISA, or the declaration**PCT/ISA/210 International search report (or PCT/ISA/203 Declaration of non-establishment of ISR), and****PCT/ISA/237 Written opinion of the ISA**

At about 16 months from the priority date, the ISA should send you the results of the international search, namely, the ISR and the written opinion of the ISA ([PCT Articles 17](#) and [18](#), [Rules 43](#), [43bis](#) and [44](#)). Form [PCT/ISA/220](#) is sent along with the results as a cover page. If the ISA decides not to establish the ISR, for example, because the application relates to an excluded subject matter, it will substitute the report with a declaration to this effect.

PCT/IB/304 Notification concerning submission, obtention or transmittal of priority document

If your application contains a priority claim and you have submitted the priority document, the IB will notify you when it has received the priority document or obtained the document via the Digital Access Service (DAS), and, in the case of multiple priority claims, whether all priority documents have been received. Make sure you receive this form; if it has not been received within a reasonable time after you furnished the priority document or DAS access code, you need to investigate – where possible within the time limit to correct priority claims ([PCT Rule 26bis](#)) – in case there was an issue with the priority claim. 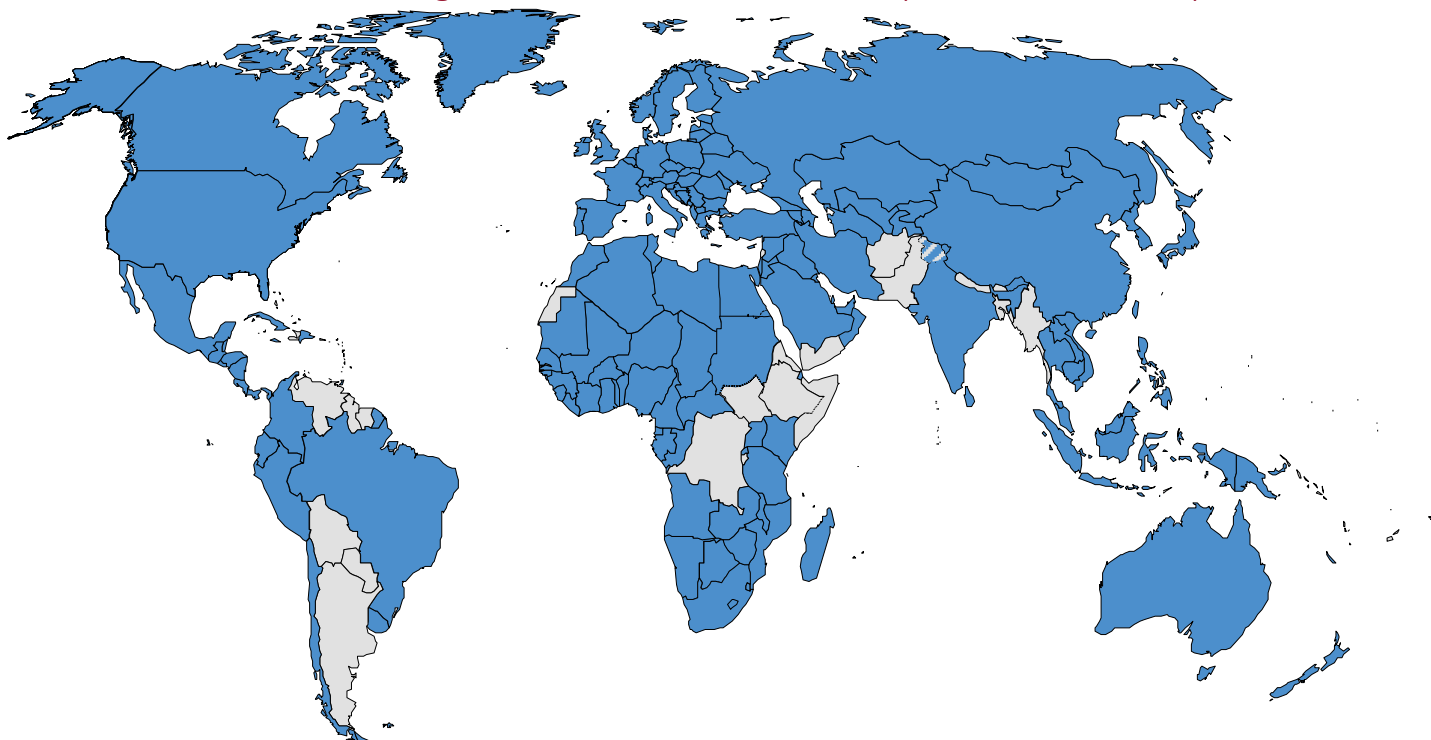

PCT Assembly – key outcomes from 58th session

All 25 ISAs and IPEAs reappointed; 26th Authority appointed; PCT Regulations amended

The PCT's governing body, the Assembly of the PCT Union (PCT Assembly), has approved the recommendations made by the [PCT Working Group](#) and the [PCT Committee for Technical Cooperation \(CTC\)](#) in February 2026.

At its 58th session, held in Geneva as part of the meetings of the Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO from 9 to 17 July 2026, the PCT Assembly:

- extended the appointment of existing International Searching and Preliminary Examining Authorities;
- appointed the Mexican Institute of Industrial Property (IMPI) as a new International Searching Authority (ISA) and International Preliminary Examining Authority (IPEA); and
- adopted a range of amendments to the PCT Regulations and modifications to Directives of the Assembly.

[Documents](#) for the session are available online, and a draft report will be published on the same web page imminently.

All 25 of the national Offices and intergovernmental organizations currently acting as International Searching and Preliminary Examining Authorities under the PCT have had their appointments extended until 31 December 2037 ([document PCT/A/58/2](#)). Before that date, they will each sign a new agreement with the International Bureau (IB) of WIPO in relation to their international search and preliminary examination operations. The Assembly approved the draft texts for these agreements in a new model format – discussed further below.

IMPI will become the 26th ISA and IPEA under the PCT – and the third based in Latin America and the Caribbean. It will begin operations after its agreement with the IB has been signed and comes into effect ([documents PCT/A/58/3](#) and [PCT/A/58/3 ADD.](#)).

Amendments to the PCT Regulations are set out in [document PCT/A/58/1](#), and include:

- Changes aimed at improving electronic services and providing a higher degree of protection for personal data provided for PCT processing. These amendments will require the provision of an email address and a telephone number for processing an international application, allow the exclusion of certain personal data from public access, and provide a basis for changing the address to which correspondence is to be addressed later than 30 months from the priority date. They will take effect from 1 July 2027.
- Changes supporting the use of a new model agreement that forms the basis of the agreements that each Office or organization will have with the International Bureau in relation to its functioning as an ISA/IPEA from 1 January 2028. The new draft agreements – each of which was also approved by the Assembly – no longer have separate annexes setting out the operational information for the relevant ISA/IPEA; this information will be published in the *Official Notices (PCT Gazette)* and reflected in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*.
- Changes to clarify that the processing of an international application considered withdrawn following failure to supply an electronic copy of an international application filed on paper in accordance with Rule 89bis.1(d-ter) will take place in the same way as other cases where the receiving Office declares that an international application is considered withdrawn.
- A minor correction of the French version of Rule 26.3ter.

The Assembly also adopted modifications to Directives of the PCT Assembly relating to the Establishment of Equivalent Amounts of Certain Fees. The modified Directives will apply from 1 January 2027 (as also set out in [document PCT/A/58/1](#)). The changes will streamline the process for establishing equivalent amounts in different currencies when the amount of a fee is changed, and will also reduce the time for a new equivalent amount to take effect following a fluctuation in an exchange rate.

PATENTSCOPE expands SEP data coverage

And tool also now offers AI-assisted search

WIPO has enhanced its global patent database, [PATENTSCOPE](#), by expanding the data on standard essential patents (SEPs) and enabling AI-assisted searches.

Since 2025, users have been able to search for “declared” SEPs – filings for patents that the holder believes are essential to a particular standard. Earlier this year, pool-verified SEP search was added to find patents that have been objectively verified as SEPs by independent experts on behalf of patent pool administrator [Sisvel](#).

Now, [Via Licensing Alliance](#) has become the second patent pool administrator to provide verified essentiality data, meaning that more than 9,000 patent applications are searchable as pool-verified SEPs.

Coverage of declared patents has also increased significantly. Data on declared SEPs from the European Telecommunications Standards Institute (ETSI) has been expanded: PATENTSCOPE now displays not only patents explicitly declared to ETSI as standard essential, but also related patent family members added by ETSI through its Family Extension.

This enhancement increases the number of distinct patent records available through the PATENTSCOPE SEP collection – which covers ETSI, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) – from over 206,000 to more than 450,000.

Users can learn more about SEPs in PATENTSCOPE during two upcoming webinars, on [1 September](#) and [3 September 2026](#).

In addition, users can now harness the power of AI to help build effective PATENTSCOPE search queries. Simply describe what you are looking for in natural language and an AI assistant will translate it into a structured search request.

The language model is hosted on WIPO premises so your search queries are kept confidential, and search capabilities will be further enhanced in due course.

The Awards were established in 2022 to celebrate startups and SMEs that use intellectual property (IP) to grow their businesses and generate positive impact. This year's competition attracted more than 1,300 applications across 126 countries.

The 11 Award-winners were selected across a range of sectors through rigorous evaluation of their business case, IP strategy, internal IP culture and contribution to addressing societal challenges. They include: Infira (agrifood startup – Argentina); AgZen (agrifood SME – United States of America); Dabida (creative industries startup – Republic of Korea); Jade ND (creative industries SME – Brazil); Flosfia (environment startup – Japan); Botree (environment SME – China); Regend (health startup – China); ArteryFlow (health SME – China); Droid (ICT startup – Chile); ICTK (ICT SME – Republic of Korea); and Bearmind (sports – Switzerland).

Winners will receive intensive mentoring on IP strategy, market access and fundraising, as well as networking opportunities as members of the Global Awards Alumni Community.

New WIPO publications

SPARK report highlights boom in GenAI patenting



Patent activity in generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) is booming, with over 56,000 patent families published in 2024 and 2025 – more than double the total for the entire previous decade.

[Patent Trends Update in GenAI](#), the latest report in WIPO's Technology SPARK series, builds on a [patent landscape report from 2024](#) to identify key developments in this fast-evolving field.

Along with a huge acceleration in the volume of related filings, the research reveals changing trends in patent ownership. SoftBank of Japan has become the largest patent holder in the field, with 2,985 patent families published between 2014 and 2025, and large multinational enterprises increasingly feature among the top applicants alongside software and internet companies.

While China continues to dominate in GenAI patenting volume, accounting for more than 42,000 published patent

families in 2024 and 2025, countries including the United States, Japan and Germany saw more dynamic patent growth during that period.

There has also been a shift in technological focus. Large language models (LLMs) have overtaken generative adversarial networks (GANs) as the dominant GenAI model type, with 14,100 patent family publications for LLMs versus 5,200 for GANs in 2025.

Investment in intangibles reaches record level

Global investment in intangibles such as research and development, software, patents, brands and other IP surpassed USD 10 trillion for the first time in 2025, according to the [World Intangible Investment Highlights 2026](#).

The study by WIPO and Luiss Business School tracked investment across 29 economies accounting for 57 percent of world GDP.

The findings underscore the critical – and growing – importance of IP-backed assets for the world economy. Between 2015 and 2025, investment in intangibles grew 2.5 times faster than investment in tangible assets.

Tool ensures biological sequence listings comply with mandatory WIPO Standard

A new version of WIPO's free-of-charge software for preparing and validating sequence listings in patent applications is now available.

The [WIPO Sequence Suite](#) ensures that sequence listings comply with [WIPO Standard ST.26](#) – a requirement for PCT applications disclosing amino acid and nucleotide sequences.

Both WIPO Sequence, the desktop application for applicants, and WIPO Sequence Validator, the web service that patent Offices use, have been updated.

[Version 3.1.2](#) is the first production release in three years. Improvements include extended bulk editing, enhanced navigation and warnings for short sequences. Following user feedback, a “hot-fix” patch which resolved reported issues, [version 3.1.3](#), has also been published.

To benefit from improved functionality and ensure you are using the most stable version available, all WIPO Sequence users are strongly encouraged to upgrade to the latest version. It is available for Windows (10/11), Mac and Linux, and the Mac binaries are now signed by WIPO.

Worksharing and fast-track procedures

GH and US sign statement of intent for Accelerated Patent Grant arrangement

The Registrar General's Department (Ghana) and the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) have signed a statement of intent for a new Accelerated Patent Grant (APG) arrangement between the two Offices.

The APG will allow eligible patent applicants who have been granted a US patent from the USPTO to request that the Registrar General's Department grant a patent on a corresponding Ghanaian patent application.

The agreement was signed on 9 July 2026 in the margins of the WIPO Assemblies and will last for five years from the date of signature.

El Salvador joins Patent Law Treaty

El Salvador has become the 45th party to the [Patent Law Treaty](#) (PLT), having deposited its instrument of accession on 7 July in the margins of the WIPO Assemblies.

The PLT streamlines formal procedures for filing and processing national or regional patent applications – making patent systems more accessible by reducing complexity and ensuring relief measures against loss of rights for applicants.

El Salvador's accession will take effect from 7 October 2026.

PCT fee reductions at the European Patent Office

Changes in eligibility – FM, JO, LK, PH and VN

Nationals of certain countries may be eligible for reductions in some PCT fees at the European Patent Office (EPO). With effect from 1 July 2026, Jordan, Micronesia (Federated States of), the Philippines, Sri Lanka and Viet Nam have been removed from the list of such countries.

The fees for international search, supplementary international search and international preliminary examination are reduced by 75% if the international application, the request for supplementary international search or the demand for international preliminary examination is filed:

1. by a natural person who is a national of and resident in a state which is not a Contracting State of the European Patent Convention, and which on the date of filing of the application, or of payment of the supplementary international search or the international preliminary examination fee, is classified by the World Bank as a low-income or lower middle-income economy; or
2. by a natural or legal person who is a national of and resident in a State in which a validation agreement with the EPO is in force.

Jordan, Micronesia (Federated States of), the Philippines, Sri Lanka and Viet Nam have been removed from the list of countries whose resident nationals are eligible for these reductions in line with a recent update to the World Bank's classification of countries.

Warning: planned WIPO IT system outages

Possible disruption to ePCT and other WIPO systems on 22 August and 1 September

Upcoming work to maintain and upgrade WIPO's information technology systems may briefly disrupt some platforms and services, including ePCT.

Services may be interrupted on two dates:

- On Saturday, 22 August, users may experience problems in accessing applications for around 10 minutes between 09:00 and 10:00 CEST, and for around 30 minutes between 10:00 and 14:00 CEST.
- On Tuesday, 1 September, between 09:00 and 10:00 CEST, users will be unable to create or confirm new WIPO Accounts, or to update WIPO Account personal information in existing WIPO Accounts. Login using existing WIPO Accounts to use ePCT and other systems should be unaffected as long as you do not need to update your personal information.

In both cases, the planned downtime is expected to be very short and application of [PCT Rule 82quater.2\(a\)](#) for excuse of delay in meeting time limits is not envisaged at this stage, as per the practice of the International Bureau. Users are nevertheless advised to factor these possible outages into their planning.

In addition to the previously available HTML versions of the two general parts of the Guide – the introduction to the international phase and the introduction to the national phase – the eGuide content available in Japanese now includes the annexes covering fees, procedures and requirements applicable in all PCT Offices.

The new format offers Japanese-speaking users easier navigation and annexes will be updated regularly, giving users more timely access to the information they need.

Practical Advice

Requirement for translations of the international application during the international phase

Q: Our company often files PCT applications in Spanish. Several of the International Searching Authorities (ISAs) specified by the receiving Offices that we use do not perform searches in Spanish. Will we need to furnish any translation during the international phase?

A: Each receiving Office (RO) determines which language(s) it accepts for applications filed with it ([PCT Rule 12.1](#)). It may accept any language. When applicants have already filed a national application in their home country and then file a subsequent PCT application on the same invention with a receiving Office that accepts that same language, they may typically use their earlier application and simply add a filled-in PCT request form. In other words, applicants may generally obtain an international filing date without having to first translate the earlier application before filing their PCT application.² For details of the languages accepted by each RO, refer to Annex C of the [PCT Applicant's Guide](#).

Each RO must accept at least one language which is both a language accepted by the ISA to perform the international search (or by at least one of the ISAs, if the applicant may choose among two or more ISAs)³ and a language of publication ([PCT Rule 12.1\(b\)](#)). Depending on the language in which the application is filed, applicants may thus have the option of filing in a particular language without having to furnish any translation during the international phase. This will be the case, for example, if you file the application in Spanish with the National Institute of Industrial Property in Chile and choose an ISA which performs searches in Spanish.⁴ The PCT request will always be in a "language of publication" that the RO accepts ([PCT Rule 12.1\(c\)](#)), with the data being used for the front page of the published application. For details of the languages accepted by each ISA, refer to Annex D of the [PCT Applicant's Guide](#).

² If the description and claims of an international application are not in a language accepted by the RO, that Office will not be a competent RO and will transmit the application to the International Bureau of WIPO as receiving Office (RO/IB) under [PCT Rule 19.4](#).

³ It is the RO that determines which ISA(s) are competent for applications filed with it; refer to [PCT Rule 35](#) for details, including for applications filed with RO/IB.

⁴ At time of writing, this would include the National Institute of Industrial Property (Chile), the National Institute of Industrial Property (Brazil) and the Spanish Patent and Trademark Office (OEPM).

If you file the PCT application in a language that is not one in which the competent/chosen ISA performs an international search, then within one month of the RO receiving your application, you must furnish a translation into a language that is accepted by the ISA concerned; for details, refer to [PCT Rule 12.3](#).

For example, if you file the application in Spanish with the National Institute of Industrial Property in Chile and wish the Ministry of Intellectual Property of the Republic of Korea (MOIP) to perform the international search, you will need to furnish a translation into Korean or English.⁵ Please note that for the original disclosure, it will be the language in which the application was filed that is relevant. Accuracy of the translation is the applicant's responsibility ([PCT Article 46](#)). Any mistake in the translation would generally need to be remedied in the national phase under applicable national procedures.

The ten languages of publication under the PCT are Arabic, Chinese, English, French, German, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish ([PCT Article 21\(4\)](#) and [Rule 48.3\(a\)](#)). If a PCT application is filed in one of these languages, it will be published in that same language, irrespective of whether any translation has been furnished after the international filing date for the international search. If the application is filed in Spanish, it will be published in Spanish; under current procedures you cannot choose to have it (also) published in any other language of publication.

If the application is published in a language other than English, the International Bureau will translate into English the title, abstract and the international search report (or declaration under [PCT Article 17\(2\)\(a\)](#) that no search report will be established), and will publish that English translation in addition to the other published language version ([PCT Articles 18\(3\)](#) and [21\(4\)](#), and [Rules 45](#) and [48.3\(c\)](#)).

In most cases where a PCT application has been filed in a language which is not a publication language and a translation has been furnished for the international search, that translation will also need to be in a language of publication and will be used for international publication. In a few cases a PCT application may be filed and searched in a language which is not also a language of publication, in which case the applicant will need to furnish a translation specifically for the international publication under [PCT Rule 12.4](#); this might be the case, for example, for applications filed and searched in Danish, Finnish, Norwegian or Swedish.

Which language(s) are accepted by an Office is typically one of the criteria to consider in choosing an RO or ISA at the time you file the PCT application. Other possible criteria include fees payable, searchable subject matter, restrictions regarding number of applications, familiarity with a particular office or its efficiency of processing, acceptance of non-conversion files, applied safeguard procedures – and more.

Details relating to the languages to be used for filing any amendments under [PCT Article 19](#), rectifications of obvious mistakes under [PCT Rule 91.1](#) or corrections of formal defects in translations can be found in [PCT Rule 12.2](#).

⁵ Note that the search fee will be different depending on which of these two languages you choose; refer to *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annex D (KR).

The following Tables show the amounts and currencies of the main PCT fees which are payable to the receiving Offices (ROs) and the International Fees which are payable only in particular circumstances are not shown; nor are details of certain reductions and refunds which may be available; such information can be found in the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Annexes C, D and E. Note that all amounts are subject to change due to variations in the fees themselves or fluctuations in exchange rates. The international filing fee may be reduced by CHF 100, 200 or 300 where the international application, or part of the international application, is filed in electronic form, as prescribed under Item 4(a), (b) and (c) of the Schedule of Fees (annexed to the Regulations under the PCT) and the *PCT Applicant's Guide*, paragraph 5.189. A 90% reduction in the international filing fee (including the fee per sheet over 30), the supplementary search handling fee and the handling fee, as well as an exemption from the transmittal fee payable to the International Bureau as receiving Office, is also available to applicants from certain States—refer to footnotes 2 and 14. (Note that if the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction, as the case may be, and the 90% reduction are applicable, the 90% reduction is calculated **after** the CHF 100, 200 or 300 reduction.) The footnotes to the Fee Tables follow Table II.

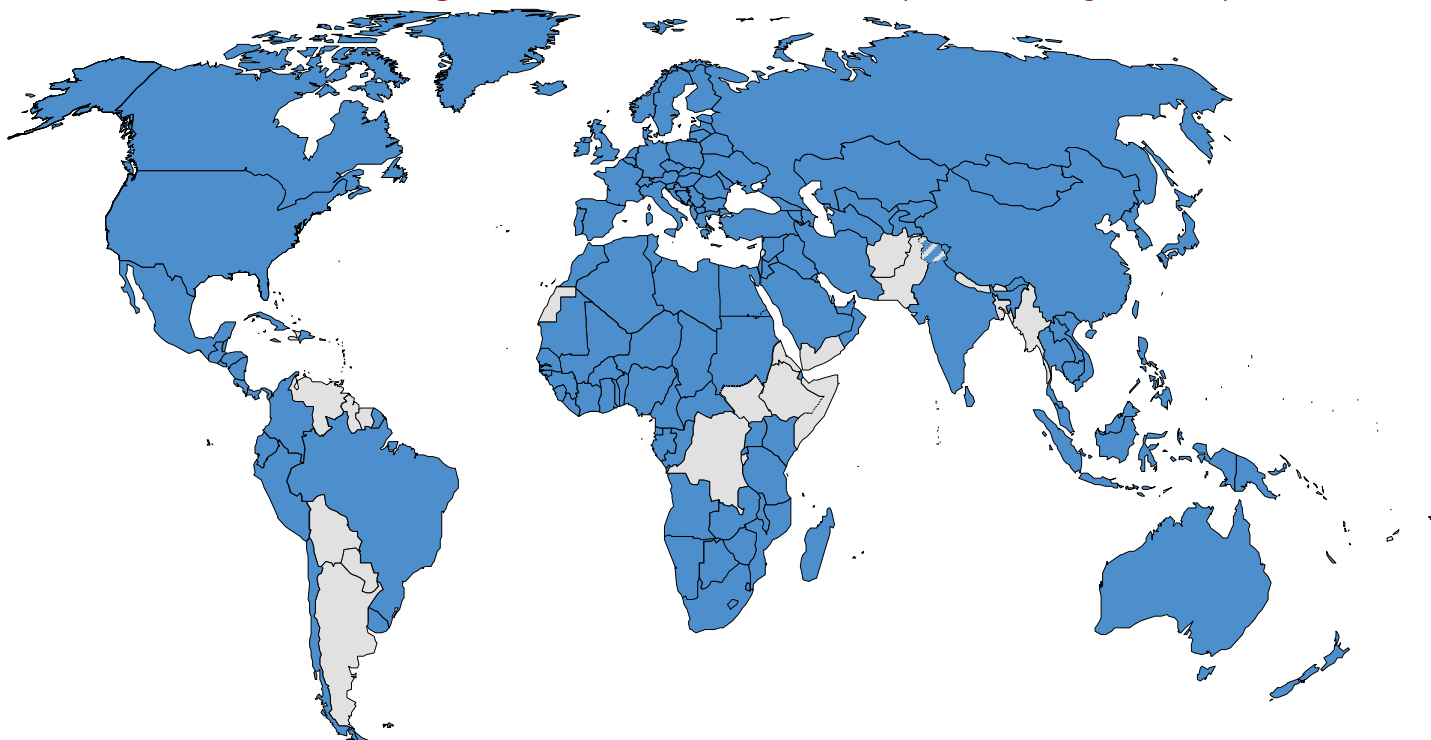
